BULL FIGHT AND BULL PING CONVICTS.—A special from El Paso, Tex., says: The bull fight Sunday afternoon at Juarez, Mexico, were viewed by an immense crowd. They were brutal and fierce in every respect, and one horse ridden by a fighter was horned three times, ripping the left foreleg almost from the body. The bulls were vicious, and kept the crowd at a fever of excitement during the afternoon. The last bull was sacred and dragged from the arena dead. While the soldiers were absent from the post attending the fight, the convict soldiers revolted at the barracks, killing the sergeant of the guards, a corporal and a private. The murderers, eighteen in number, broke from the barracks and escaped to the mountains. They were followed by the soldiers, three overtaken and shot to death, and four captured and returned to the post. They are ordered to be killed at sunrise next day.

STOLEN BY A MONSTER OF THE AIR.—On Sunday morning a large bird was noticed circling around the town of Italy, Texas, and suddenly it descended into the yard of Charles Waller, seized Waller's four-year-old boy in its talons and ascended slowly. Grasping his gun the child's father mounted his horse and went in pursuit. The bird made direct for the creek bottom, two miles from the town; but after carrying the child half way it slowly descended, alighting near a deep ravine. The father dismounted and crept up the ravine within a few yards of the bird, which was standing on the child's breast, and shot it in the head. The child was unhurt, but the talons of the bird were still in the child's clothing. The bird measured three feet from tip to tip of the wings.

HEAVILY LOADED.—The census reports, so far as tabulated, show that the people of the United States are carrying mortgages for upwards of \$850,000,000. A large part of the burden is borne by the Western States, where money has been required for the purchase or improvement of land and the development of industrial enterprises. A good deal of capital has been used in the new manufacturing districts of the South, notably in Alabama and Tennessee, but in these instances a rich return has well repaid the investment. Altogether, however, it is a startling exhibit, and furnishes food for thought as well as a reason why there is a loud call for a bankruptcy law.
