A Remarkable Case For the past ten days there has been in Washington on business before Congress a man who has had a most dangerous and peculiar experience. He is one of the few men in history who have had moments greeted to them before they were taken by death. The man is Col. James F. Wilson, of Virginia, but originally of Illinois. Col. Wilson was married in Virginia during the late war at the head of an Illinois regiment. His home was in Peoria in that State. At the battle of Chancellorsville he was in the thickest of it. A bullet struck him in the forehead and came out at the back of the head. He was reported dead to the War Department, and it was thought that he had died at home. But he was not dead. An old colored man discovered signs of life in him the day after the fighting and took him to his cabin. The bullet had followed the convulsions of the brain, and the man lived. But for five or six years he remembered nothing prior to the time at which he came to himself in the old darky's cabin. He established himself in Virginia after the war was over, and built up a good business. He entered into politics and became one of the republican leaders. Gradually his mind cleared up, and he recalled the antecedents of his life. He went back to his home in Peoria, and found his family all well. He also found in the family lot in the cemetery a neat monument erected by his wife and children to the memory of Col. Charles F. Wilson, "who fell fighting valiantly for his country" at the battle of Chancellorsville. Col. Wilson had become so enamored of life in Virginia that he took his family back there with him as permanent residents. His monument still stands in Peoria. Col. Wilson says that he would not have it taken down for anything. And, besides, he does not know when he will ever get another.

A BRISTLING COAT OF FEATHERS—A coat of tar and feathers was smeared over the body of James Emmons, a young farmhand near Bennetts Mills N. J., a night or two ago. Emmons, it appears, had made visits to the daughter of Hampton Sparks, a colored resident of Bennetts Mills, and had received "rewards" from a "White Cap." He paid no attention to them. Armed with two pairs of tar and a bushel basket of feathers a gang of young men from Eggleston and Meigsport surrounded Sparks's house, called Emmons out, overpowered him and dragged him out upon a lot stripping him the gang upped the horrid coat. Emmons has called the arrest of a dozen or more of his assailants.
