A Great Mausoleum

The plans for the great structure which
the New Mausoleum company intends to
erect in Greenwood cemetery, Brooklyn,
have been completed by Messrs. Carrere
and Hastings, the architects, and it is stated
that the work of construction will be in
progress before the close of the present year.
The mausoleum will be a building of impos-
ing size and stately proportions, and it will
be devoted to the preservation of the dead
by the method of the New Mausoleum
company, which, although original, is yet,
in a sense, but a return to the ancient cus-
toms of Egypt, Rome and Greece.

The general form of the mausoleum will
be that of a square extending 250 feet in
each direction. It will stand on the slope
of a hill to that part of Greenwood cemetery
adjacent to Ninth avenue and Twentieth
street, and will command a view of the
country for miles around. The style will be
that of the Italian renaissance, and there
will be three stories below the ground. Marble
and concrete are the only materials to be
used in its construction. From the centre
will rise a tower to the height of 160 feet.
On its ground floor will be a memorial hall
and in the centre a catafalque on which will
rest the coffin during whatever services may
occur previous to its removal to its final
resting place in the sepulchre.

In this immense mausoleum, which is to
cost \$750,000, there will be 30,000 sepulchres.
Chapels of various sizes will open on the
main arcade, which run around the four
sides of the square and also across the court
at right angles, separating it into four smaller
courts. The largest chapels, or chambers,
will contain 18 sepulchres, in three tiers of 6
sepulchres each, and smaller chapels will
be in less favorable locations on the arcade,
chambers in which single bodies can be
placed. The sepulchres are to be of con-
crete, formed over a mold, in one piece and
air tight. The preservation of the body is
to be accomplished by a simple process of de-
hydration. A current of dry air will be cir-
culated through the sepulchre for a period
of four to eight months, and thus the body
will be gradually dried to a state where it
will keep forever. The air will be first pre-
pared by passing it over sulphuric acid.

The large chapels will be left for the
adornment of those who purchase them. A
millionaire can decorate his burial chamber
in gold and silver. Opposite the chapels,
on the other side of the arcade, are niches
for statuary. When a coffin is placed in its
sepulchre it will be opened so as to disclose
the features and the upper part of the body,
and a glass plate will be sealed over the
sepulchre so that the features can be seen at
any time. In cases where there is a possi-
bility of resuscitation the coffin will be
placed in a sepulchre connected by a system
of wires with the office of the director
of the mausoleum, and the slightest move-
ment of the body will be instantly detected.

The floor of the arcade will be tiled in
mosaic patterns. There will be four grand
staircases, four service stairways and four
elevators. The receiving vaults, to contain
500 bodies will be under the terraces in front
of the mausoleum. At each of the four
corners of the building will be a square
chamber with a domed ceiling. All of the
ceilings will be arched. The cost of the
chapel will vary from \$100 to \$4,000. When
the mausoleum is full—which will be in
about seven years, if the ordinary rate of
interment at Greenwood is maintained—another
mausoleum has the capacity of thirty
acres of cemetery.

Ground has been broken at Kenilco, the
large new cemetery above White Plains, for
a mausoleum somewhat smaller in size than
the one projected for Greenwood, but sim-
ilar to it in shape. It will cost \$200,000.
Work on the receiving vaults is in progress.
Mausoleums are also to be built at Roch-
ester, New Orleans, St. Paul, and Detroit.—
New York Times

"A JACK HORNER" PIE—A delighful sur-
prise for a birthday party is a Jack Horner
man's pie. "I have made these pies for
many years," said a lady of our acquaint-
ance the other day, "and now the confec-
tioners produce them as a 'boute nouvelle.'"
But the home-made ones are the best, and I
will tell you, if you like, just how to make
them. In the first place you will buy a
pate for each child who is expected—a
small article which will not take up too
much room—and to each give a long,
narrow ribbon. Now proceed and make your
pie. Take a large, deep tin pan—the
size will, of course, depend upon your
number of guests—line it with pink tissue
paper, leaving the edges long enough,
and scallop and press over the edge in a
sort of a ruche. The presents are then laid in,
and narrow strips of thick paper are pasted,
criss-cross over the top of the pan. The
apertures left must be large enough to ad-
mit of each little parcel passing through.
Draw the ribbons through the holes, one to
each, and then paste over the whole top
white tissue-paper, cutting little slits for the
ribbon to pass through. ornament the pie
with paper flowers and serve. The dish is
placed in the centre of the table, and the
children each take a ribbon and draw out in
turn their plum.
