ENTITLED TO INTEREST.—As stated in the GAZETTE, Judge Richardson in the Court of Appeals on Thursday delivered the opinion in the case of McVeigh against Howard, from the Circuit Court of Alexandria city. On January 9, 1878, Mr. McVeigh, father of the plaintiff in error, gave Mr. John Howard a bond for \$10,000 for professional services rendered. A portion of the money was paid, when a dispute arose as to whether interest began on the day payment was demanded or from the date of the bond. The opinion of the court was that as the bond was given for services already rendered interest began from its date. The general maxim was laid down that in Virginia a bond or note payable on demand bears interest from date. This affirmed the verdict of the lower court. The interest in this case amounts to between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

MUSICAL.—The twenty-sixth complimentary rehearsal of the Alexandria Musical Association was given at their pleasant concert last night, which, as usual, were crowded. The music was of a high order, among the numbers being a well arranged selection from a Flotow's "Martha," and the overture from Guonod's "Faust" for orchestra. Miss Lullie Rathbone, of this city, was the solo vocalist, two numbers being assigned her and that she was well received was attested by the plaudits given her. The supply of fish is increasing and prices will soon be lower.

MR. SPEAR'S WILL.—In the Robert Spear will case, which has been on trial for the last three days in the Circuit Court of the District of Columbia, the four issues submitted to the jury were all decided in favor of Judge Critcher, the proponent of the will.

FISH.—The receipts of herring are increasing, but so far the catch of shad is light, though other varieties of fish are becoming more plentiful. Herring sold at from \$7 to \$8 per thousand.
