

letter from Mrs. Jefferson Davis, dated New

York city, in reference to the unveiling of

the monument in Jackson in June:

"When the proposal was made to erect

this monument we feared years must elapse

Koch's LYMPH OF GREAT VALUE.—At a

meeting of the New York Academy of Medi-

cine Thursday night the physicians who

have been experimenting with Koch's

lymph for some time, submitted the results

of their investigations. Dr. Alfred L.

Loomis presided and about 100 physicians

were present. Dr. Weund said that the re-

sults were such as to encourage him to con-

tinue the use of the lymph. Dr. Loomis

summed up all the reports thus: "In the

lymph we have an agent which can do good

and very great harm. We may conclude

that it requires care in its use, as well as

more experience with it. I am fully of the

opinion that it is going to take a prominent

place in the treatment of tuberculosis, and

that it is going to save more lives imperiled

by that disease than any other agent. Still

it may kill more than it saves if we use it

recklessly."

A WOMAN CAPTURES A BURGLAR—Mrs.

David Kehoe, a powerfully built woman,

who resides with her husband in Paterson,

N. J., saw a burly thief enter her room

about 2 o'clock Thursday morning. She

sprang out of bed and grappled with the
