MEMORIAL DAY.—The graves of all the Confederates buried in the cemetery near this city were strewn with lovely flowers this evening by members of Lee Camp who had been detailed for that purpose. The flowers were contributed by the city in general, many of whom aided in the decoration. At 6 o'clock this evening the ceremony attending the decoration of the Confederates mound in Christ Church yard and of the Confederates monument will take place according to the programme published on Saturday.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

Dr. Charles Watts, who married Miss Kate E. Simpson, of this city, died at Lockport, N. Y., on the 22d.

Elder A. B. Francis, of Loudoun county, of the Primitive Baptist Church, yesterday morning baptised Mrs. Cornelia Sinclair, of West End, in the river at the north end of the city in the presence of a large number of spectators. After the baptizing Mr. Francis conducted services at the Primitive Baptist Church.

One of the volumes of the records of Fairfax county that was "captured" during the war has been loaned to Dr. Toner, of Washington, by Mr. G. W. Miner, of Uniontown, Pa., and is to be returned to the authorities of Fairfax county. It is the order book of the Fairfax County Court, and begins its record on July 20, 1756.

Hon. J. J. Hickman, of Kentucky, the temperance orator, will reach Virginia May 21st, and will remain in this city till June 2d. He speaks at Orange Court House June 3d, Charlottesville June 4th and 5th, Lynchburg June 6th and 7th, Roanoke City June 8th, and in Richmond June 22d to 26th.

Joseph Fielden, the light-weight pugilist, convicted in the Criminal Court of Washington on Thursday of assault on a battery, was on Saturday evening sentenced to a term of months and twenty-nine days in the District jail.

The colored voters who are dissatisfied at the way they have been treated by their white leaders, will hold a meeting at their Odd Fellows' hall to-night "to show the leaders that they are not asleep."

MONETARY AND COMMERCIAL.

NEW YORK, May 25.—The stock market opened the new week with an active business, which, however, was principally in a half dozen stocks, while the unusually strong tone of last week was missing and some hesitation became apparent.

First prices were generally small fractions lower than the closing figures of Saturday, though a firm tone was immediately developed, and among the active shares advances over the opening figures, extending to 1/2%, were scored. These gains were generally lost in the latter dealings, however, when the market was less active. The market displayed no other marked feature at 11 o'clock it was active and heavy, generally at small fractions below the opening prices.


