MASONIC RECEPTION.—A letter from Beverly, Mass., says: The Masonic friends of Charles Woodberry tendered him a reception at Masonic hall, on the evening of the fourth instant. Past Master John B. Hill presided. The occasion was complimentary to Mr. Woodberry, he having returned from a pilgrimage to Alexandria, Va. He gave an interesting account of his trip. Remarks were also made by W. R. Driver, Geo. A. Galloupe, and G. P. Taylor of Essex lodge, Salem. Rev. E. C. Butler presented Mr. Woodberry with an elegant past master's jewel. A feature of the occasion was the presentation to Liberty lodge by Mr. Woodberry of a carved corone stone, taken from Beverly minister, at Beverly, England. The church is 334 feet long, the erection of which was commenced in the 13th century. Accompanying the stone was a book of views of Beverly, England, presented by Secretary and Past Master Harry Adams of Constitutional lodge, No. 294, of Beverly, Eng., and an autograph letter from the mayor of the city, Louis Larned.

The Beverly Citizen says: The readers of the Citizen have been made fully acquainted with the object and results of the mission of Past Master Charles Woodberry to Alexandria, Va. His Masonic friends decided to give him a reception on his return, and they assembled in Liberty lodge-room on Thursday evening for this purpose. Past Master John B. Hill presided and introduced Mr. Woodberry, who entered ained those present with an account of his trip, commencing with his leaving Washington until his return. At the conclusion of the narrative of his experiences, presented Mr. Woodberry a handsome past master's jewel, to which the surprised recipient responded in terms of grateful acknowledgment. Short addresses were also made by Past Master E. L. Giddings, W. R. Driver, George A. Galloupe, Master of Liberty lodge, and by George P. Taylor of Salem, who was made a master mason in Alexandria lodge.

BOARD OF HEALTH.—Dr. Purvis, Health Officer, and Superintendent of Police Doble yesterday made their rounds of the city to investigate its sanitary condition, which they found to be comparatively good. Today Dr. Purvis issued a number of notices to persons in different parts of the city to abate minor nuisances, and will see that such notices are heeded. Another round will be made to-morrow. As but few members of the Board of Health have qualified Dr. Purvis will request Council to make it a part of the duties of the police officers to look after the sanitary condition of the city.

DEAD.—Mr. John R. Scott died at his residence in Washington on Monday evening, aged fifty-four years. Mr. Scott was a native of this city, and was in the employ of the old Washington and Alexandria railroad here for some years; subsequently was a drawkeeper on the Long bridge, but for about fifteen years had been employed at the Washington depot as a watchman or special officer, and in the latter capacity has been favorably known as an obliging officer on the platform of the Baltimore and Potomac railroad.

BASEBALL.—The Cleveland High School club played a very interesting game of ball with the Delaplane club at Markham yesterday evening. The score stood 14 to 6 in favor of Delaplane. Quite a crowd witnessed the game. The ladies were well represented.

The game of ball played in this city on Tuesday between the B. & D. and B. & P. R. R. clubs resulted in favor of the former by a score of 23 to 14.

A VERDICT FOR \$13,000.—Yesterday in the Circuit Court of Washington, the jury in the case of Thomas Woods against the Richmond and Danville Railroad Company found a verdict for plaintiff for \$13,000 damages. This was an action to recover \$30,000 for injuries received in 1887 by a train in this city, and which had been on trial for several days. Mr. Edmund Burke appearing for complainant and Messrs. Linden Kent and C. C. Cole for defendant.

FINE AND LICENSES.—Mayor Dewham last night made his annual settlement with the city finance committee. During the year he collected \$1,223 25 in fines and \$8,085 90 in licenses. The amount of licenses exceeded that of any previous year and that of fines any other year except one—that of 1888.

THE FEAST OF PENTECOST.—Beginning this evening, Pentecost, the Hebrew Feast of Weeks, will be celebrated. The festival is just fifty days after Passover, and is said to commemorate the giving of the Decalogue on Mt. Sinai. The orthodox congregations will celebrate Saturday as the second day of the festival.

A committee was appointed to write a suitable school history of the late war, with Prof. C. S. Venable, of the University of Virginia as chairman. The Grand Camp then adjourned to meet next June in Roanoke.
