

LOCAL MATTERS.

MONDAY EVENING, SEPTEMBER 14.

For this section slightly cooler, fair weather, northerly winds.

CORPORATION COURT.—Judge J. K. M. Norton presiding.—A. V. Taylor and H. B. Simpson were granted certificates of character to enable them to apply for permission to practice law.

Mrs. Melvina Greenough qualified as administrator of E. A. Greenough, deceased. O. P. Fegan, a native of Ireland, was naturalized a citizen of the United States.

W. D. Stewart was appointed clerk for this term in place of J. S. Smith on account of the latter's relationship with G. R. Smith, who was killed by J. F. Phillips, who was case in before the grand jury.

The grand jury returned true bills to the following indictments: Henry Chesbire robbery; Harry Posa and Edward Schuler robbery; Turner Gaines, assault with intent to kill; John Clark, burglary and robbery; (Chromo) Lester, breaking into a railroad car; J. F. Phillips, murder. The grand jury returned no true bills to the indictments against Ernest Humphries for robbery and Wm. Madella, colored, for burglary. The grand jury was then discharged and court adjourned till to-morrow.

It is probable that no criminal cases will be tried at this term of the court.

POLICE REPORT.—Last night was cloudy with rain till about 11 o'clock, after that time it became clear. There were three prisoners and one lodger at the station house.

The Mayor this morning disposed of the following cases: Chas. Jackson and Frank Brown, colored boys, for stealing money from Mrs. George Harlow, were sent to jail to await the action of the grand jury, said Ed. Jamieson and Lawrence Bolden, colored boys, arrested on the same charge, were dismissed.

Martha Lewis, colored, and Jas. Lucas, colored, for disorderly conduct; Dan Ferguson, colored, for an assault on Mary Lee, also colored, and Henry Mason, colored, for an assault on Susan Mason, also colored, were fined \$2.50 each.

Andrew Jackson, colored, for stealing money from Mrs. M. Smith and Chas. Toms, colored, for disorderly conduct, were fined \$5 each or given 30 days in jail.

A young man, for being drunk and disorderly, was fined \$5 and his mother for disorderly conduct at the station house, was fined \$2.50.

Galeb Marlow, for stealing dresses from Frances Bryant, was sent to jail for six months.

A suburban saloon keeper, charged with selling liquor on Sunday, was discharged for want of evidence.

Doc Baltimore, colored, for an assault on O. Keys, had his case continued.

Isiah Bowles, colored, for selling liquor on Sunday, was fined \$10.

YOUNG THIEVES.—Mrs. George Harlow, while standing in front of her residence on Prince street about 8 o'clock on Saturday night, was approached by Chas. Jackson and Frank Brown, two colored boys, who asked her who lived in the house, saying that they had been sent there by a lady. Mrs. H. had just returned from shopping and had a pocketbook in her hand containing about \$8. As she answered the boys' question one of them snatched the pocketbook and both ran off. The police were notified, and later the boys were arrested just as they were in the act of purchasing fried oysters at a King-street saloon and the money was recovered. The boy who grabbed the pocketbook soon afterwards handed it to the other boy, who took \$3 from it before returning it to his companion. To-day the boys had a preliminary trial and were sent on to the grand jury.

DEATHS.—Mr. John Andrew Williams, a well-known citizen, died at his home, on south Alfred street, yesterday morning. Although he had been in bad health for a long time, his death was unexpected. Mr. Williams has been master painter at the Midland Railroad shops for a long time past, and was well and favorably known in the community.

Andrew, the only son of Mr. Gilbert Dove, died at his home near Accotink on Saturday, in the sixteenth year of his age, of congestion of the brain. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. S. A. Walls on Sunday evening. Mr. Dove has the sympathy of the entire community in his affliction; he has been ill for several weeks with typhoid fever and his wife is also very sick.

REHEARSERS' FAIR.—The preliminaries for the fair which begins to-morrow at McBurney's Hall for the benefit of Virginia Tent of Rechabites have all been finished. The room is handsomely decorated and the different tables and booths are tastefully arranged. A feature of the fair will be the arrangements made for the convenience and comfort of visitors, so that all who attend may expect to spend an evening of enjoyment. Among the articles to be voted for is a lady's diamond ring, a fireman's pin, an Old Fellow's ring, a Junior Order American Mechanics' pin, a Rechabites pin and a lady's gold watch.

OPERA HOUSE.—To-night Jim the Westerner will be produced here for the first time. The Harford Courier says: "It is an excellent play and the plot is good. Jim Errol is a honest-hearted miner from the West. His hard earnings were stolen by a trusted partner. Then there is a reaction, and his prospects brighten, dependancy is changed to exultation and the villain is discomfited. Every character in the play is well sustained, and the scenic effects are good. The humor of the piece is sustained by Deacon Simon Deens, who is addicted to betting, and his wife, Jerash, who is a crank."

COUNTY DEMOCRATS.—The county democratic executive committee recently elected met at the County Court House this morning at 10:30. All the members were present except Mr. Jacob Birch, of Washington district. The committee organized by electing Mr. A. P. Douglas, of Arlington district, chairman. A mass meeting of the democratic voters of the county was called for Thursday night at Walker school house for the purpose of electing delegates to meet with city delegates to nominate a candidate for the House of Delegates.

COUNTY COURT.—Judge D. M. Chichester presiding.—The court was occupied to-day in hearing the case of John Murray, colored, indicted for the murder of W. C. Chinn, a so colored. Chinn, it will be remembered, was shot and killed by Murray during a quarrel on Sunday, May 10, last, near a church at Hall's Hill. The trial will probably last for two days longer. The Commonwealth is represented by Messrs. R. W. Johnston and J. H. Greene, and the prisoner by Messrs. S. G. Brent, C. C. Carlin and Geo. Kearney.

PERSONAL.—Rev. Wm. Cabell Brown and Rev. John G. Meem, jr., graduates of the Virginia Theological Seminary, left on their way to Brazil as missionaries, sailing in the mail steamer from Newport News yesterday afternoon. Mr. Brown carries his wife, formerly Miss Dorsey, and Miss Peckard, daughter of Professor Peckard, of the Virginia Theological Seminary, goes with the party.

SCHOOL PERMITS.—The clerk of the City School Board, to-day resumed the issuing of permits to children to attend the public schools and throughout the year will be at his office in Peabody building every Monday morning from 9 till 10 o'clock for the same purpose. To-day he issued 233 permits—41 to white boys and 29 to white girls, 77 to colored boys and 86 to colored girls.

BODY RECOVERED.—The body of Officer Constantine, of the Washington police force, who was drowned from the police boat Joe Blackburn near Stump Neck on Thursday night last, was recovered this morning and taken back to Washington.

PERSONAL.—Mr. E. H. Kemper, who recently went to Atlanta with the B. & O. E. officers, spent yesterday with his family in this city. He says all the Alexandrians are getting along well, but would rather be at home than in Atlanta.

LOCAL BREVITIES
A marriage license was issued in Washington on Saturday to Wilson Webster and Lebbie Evans, both of Fairfax county.

The day for the excursion of the railroad men has been changed to Wednesday, Sept. 16. The train will leave the W. & O. depot at 8:45 a. m. for Paonian Springs, Clark's Gap. All of the railroad employees and their friends are expected to take part in the excursion.

Dr. Purvis and Messrs. C. C. Carlin and C. W. Moore, appointed by Judge Norton to examine into the condition of the jail, to-day presented their quarterly report, which states that the jail is in a good sanitary condition.

A NEGRO'S HORRIBLE REVENGE.—In Hayti and Martinique the venom of the terrible serpent indigenous to those islands, the formidable fer de lance, has been often employed by the negroes in disposing of their enemies, says the St. Louis Globe-Democrat. A horrible but well-authenticated instance of negro ingenuity and malice is told in Martinique. A huge negro, recently imported from the Guinea coast, had been whipped by the order of his master, one of the great planter princes of the island while it was under French rule. The victim made no complaint, but meditated vengeance.

By long search he found the lair of a pair of serpents in the garden adjacent to the house. Watching his opportunity he killed one and dragged its body to the house through a window that was always open and into the bed-room of the beautiful daughter of the planter. He dragged it to the bed, lifted the coverings, and coiled the reptile on the sheet. When this was done he carried the dead snake away and cast it into an adjacent stream.

As night approached the serpent's mate followed the trail, crept through the open window, and to the bed of the planter's daughter. The latter, half awake, made a motion to brush away the intruder. Instantly the fangs were buried in her neck, and in a few hours she was a corpse.

Richmond and West Point made material concessions in the early trading. Richmond and West Point preferred, however, after opening down 1 per cent at 55, retired 53. The losses in the general list were partially recovered, but the market displayed no recuperative power, and at 11 o'clock it was fairly active and heavy at or near the lowest prices reached.




