Count Mitkiewicz Beaten

Count Eugene de Mitkiewicz was mu'cted for \$25 on Monday in the City Court, before Chief Justice Ehrlich and a jury. The suit was brought against the Count by Banker Joseph Gamble to recover money alleged to have been expended in investigating the Count's reputed concession from the Chinese government.

According to Mr. Gamble's allegation the Count represented to him, between November, 1889, and January, 1890, that he had a valuable concession from the Chinese government to establish in the United States the American Oriental Bank, with a capital of \$15,000,000. Mr. Gamble, Mr. Tarber and other capitalists were interested in the concession to raise the capital. He made several trips to Washington in the interest of the bank, but claimed to have learned while in that city that the Count had no concession from the Chinese government. In the course of his investigation Mr. Gamble incurred expenses and made advances to the Count for which he demanded payment.

William L. Payne and Banker Walter S.anton testified that an agreement had existed in reference to the Chinese concessions between the Count, Gamble, themselves and others.

Count Mitkiewicz took the stand and told the story of the transaction. Mr. Gamble was introduced to him, he said, in his rooms in the Fifth Avenue Hotel in 1889 by Senator Stephen W. Dorsey. The Senator was anxious to have Gamble join in the Chinese concessions project. After examining some documents relating to the affair, Mr. Gamble advised that he would not touch it. He claimed that the English government would interfere to prevent the granting of the concessions. Dorsey disagreed with him and Mr. Gamble afterward changed his mind.

An agreement was entered into by which Mr. Gamble was to look after the financial part of the affair, while Count Mitkiewicz attended to the diplomatic negotiations. He went to Washington to see the Chinese Minister, but that official refused to receive him, to bring Mitkiewicz to Mr. Gamble's apartment, but a capitalist. Mr. Gamble's anxiety to see the necessary capital would be forthcoming the Count claimed to have advanced \$5,000 in entertaining the members of the Chinese Legation at the Fifth Avenue Hotel and Long Branch.

He claimed that he had never agreed to pay back the money Gamble had expended.

It was spent, he asserted, to urge the project.
