### A Night of Terror.

Last Friday morning two Portland  
ladies staying at the Lawson House,  
Harpwell, accompanied by two young  
men, one of them a graduate from the  
college at Montreal, left Harpswell in  
an open boat for the city. The south-  
east storm of the night previous had  
evidently blown itself out, and there  
seemed to be signs of clearing weather.  
The party reached Portland in safety,  
although they found the sea heavy, for  
they had a very strong enough to bring  
them along quickly.

The party stayed in town but a short  
time, as they desired to get back to  
Harpwell before night set in. If they  
had possessed much knowledge of naviga-  
tion in these parts they might have  
seen that the wind had shifted back  
into the northeast quarter, and that the  
signs were good for a tough storm. But  
they started off, thinking they would  
have no trouble. Before they had been  
very long the wind arose as they were  
reached the open places where the sea  
had a sweep, the boat began to labor  
and the situation became serious. In  
manoeuvring the boat a heavy sea  
smashed the rudder, and for a few mo-  
ments the boat narrowly escaped  
swamping. Before control was obtained  
the boat was swept out beyond the line  
of the islands, and then a most perilous  
voyage began. The boat shipped seas,  
and it required the constant efforts  
of all hands to bail out. At  
times it seemed as if each moment  
would be the last that the frail craft  
would remain afloat, tossed as she was  
at the mercy of the storm. The hours  
passed as they were ages. The howling  
north-east wind drove the boat be-  
fore it, and darkness gathered, night  
came on, and the four occupants of the  
boat, never expecting to see home  
again, still strove to keep their boat  
afloat and to keep up their courage.  
About four o'clock Saturday morning,  
after being exposed for 13 hours,  
drenched all that time to the skin and  
more or less bruised and battered by  
the pitching of the boat, the great  
waves tossed them into Simonton's  
Cove, just beyond Fort Preble. They  
were compelled to leave their boat and  
waded almost up to their necks before  
reaching land, where they dropped on  
the beach.

As soon as they could gather strength  
they sought the first place of shelter,  
a fisherman's house, and aroused the in-  
mates, who furnished them dry clothes,  
wrapped them in blankets and gave  
them a thorough warming, and later in  
the morning they came to town in one  
of the barges that run from the Cape to  
the city. Their friends at Harpswell  
supposed they were safe in town, and  
their friends in Portland supposed they  
were in Harpswell. Some of the party  
were suffering from the exposure. It  
was a narrow escape from death and a  
night of terror to all concerned.—*Port-  
land Daily Press.*

TOSSED BY A RUNAWAY BULL.—Canaris  
Lane, Flatbush, L. I., was thronged Sunday

force of men, led by Thomas Muffin, gave  
chase to the angry bull and he was finally  
killed near the Insane Asylum.

The owner of the dead brute is unknown.  
It is believed that he lives in Canaris, and  
the town authorities are endeavoring to find  
him.

The injured men were tenderly cared for  
and taken home where it was discovered that  
Mullin's collar bone had been dislocated and  
three of his ribs broken, while Fitzpatrick was  
severely bruised.
