The Price of Coal.

Coal is now selling for 25 cents more
per ton than it was before September 1,
and soon, if the Reading coal combine
succeeds in carrying out its plans for in-
crease, another rise of 10 cents or more
will follow, not before the end of this
month, however, for the September circu-
lar has fixed prices until October 1.

The dispute between the Reading and the
Pennsylvania Railroad companies about
increasing the rate of freight on
coal is not so complicated as it may
seem.

There was a gradual increase in the
rate of freight until at the beginning of
this month the rate from the mines to
Philadelphia was \$1.70 and to Balti-
more \$2. The price of coal at
Baltimore was \$2.45; at Washington, \$2.80;
at Philadelphia, \$2.80; at Baltimore,
\$2.80. To find the price at Philadelphia or
Baltimore, the freight—\$1.70 or \$2,
respectively—must be added. Now the
Reading on Monday raised its freight
rate to Philadelphia to \$1.80 and de-
clares in this city have understood that it
is proposed to advance the rate to Bal-
timore to \$2.10. These are, of course,
all wholesale prices of mine agents,
though if they increase retail figures
must rise proportionately.

In the coal business the situation is
controlled entirely by the railroads, and
whatever they choose to charge the
mines and consequently the public must
pay. As to the case in point, the rail-
roads have been getting two-fifths of
the selling price of coal at points of de-
livery. For instance, stove coal selling
at wholesale in Baltimore at \$2 per ton
paid the railroad company \$5 per ton
for freight. Coal is the most profitable
class of freight that is hauled, for it will
bear heavy charges.

Now the Pennsylvania railroad, in
refusing to raise its coal tolls as the
Reading did on Monday, practically
says that coal has been taxed high
enough by the railroads. That is the
way the matter stands, but the Reading
has the biggest hand in the case, by
reason of its own immense ownership
of anthracite coal lands and its control
of others through its alliance with the
Lehigh Valley and Jersey Central.

One large wholesale firm in this city
has ordered its shipments of coal which
used to come via the Reading and
Baltimore and Ohio, to be transferred
to the Pennsylvania lines.—*Balt. News.*
