New York Republican Leaders Arrive
N. Y. STATE FARMERS' ALLIANCE,)
PRESIDENT'S OFFICE,)
NEW YORK, Oct. 25, 1892.
To the Editor of the Alexandria Gazette:
Your criticism of the Farmers' Alliance, published in your issue of the 22nd inst., is commendable if it takes any part against the democracy which is struggling to save the South and West from their spoliation. Any man who contributes to the success of the thieves now managing the national republican committee, deserves to have the bayonet pointed at his heart by the officials of the Force bill which is sure to come in the event of the re-election of Harrison.
The Farmers' Alliance has been a necessity at the West, where it will contribute to the election of Cleveland.
But the republican robbers have nearly two and one half millions in their pockets to buy the State of New York, Dave Martin, Senator Quay and C. W. Hackett, engineered by the notorious Thos. C. Platt, whose conduct, words and actions, when he resigned from the U. S. Senate with Roscoe Conkling, because Garfield would not remove Collector Robertson, precipitated the assassination of that unfortunate President, have all their plans for bribing the voters.
The cohesive power of common plunder has unified the "stalwarts" and "half-breds," who, since 1881, have slaughtered each other so severely as to enable that greatest of all living politicians, the Hon. David Bennett Hill, to redeem, for the democrats, the Empire State in all its departments, executive, legislative and judicial.
"Tom" Platt had ample reason for burying Warner Miller outside of the party works, not only because Miller secured his seat in the U. S. Senate, but because he and his friends, Charles W. Hackett and the late James W. Husted, put up a natty job on him by which a human frailty was detected and exposed.
Mr. Platt has paid out large sums yearly to keep control of the republican State committee, and has never permitted Miller to again hold office. He ran, in January, 1887, for U. S. Senator, but Platt put up Lexi P. Morton, against him. Morton and Platt paid me \$568.50 for lobby services in that contest wherein I acted for Morton. Warner Miller and Morton each got forty-seven votes in the assembly, and, after 49 ballots, neither could secure the other vote requisite to elect. So, as Hon. Frank Hiseock had eleven votes, and as the sole desire of Platt was to defeat Miller, I was ordered to turn Morton's 47 votes over to Hiseock and those elected him.
Then, Warner Miller ran on the ticket with Harrison and Morton for Governor of New York; but "Tom" Platt traded Miller's vote for Harrison, and then, while Harrison and Morton were elected, David B. Hill defeated Warner Miller by several thousand votes.
Last autumn, as you are aware, Roswell P. Flower defeated J. Sloat Fassett, "Platt's man Friday," by nearly 50,000. As Platt is the republican boss to whom Harrison has pledged the Treasury Department, as a condition precedent to his "placement," and as Platt took away from New York city the World's fair, whereby, as Chauncey M. Depew said, in his speech at Washington, three hundred million dollars had been taken away from the State of New York, it is not possible the same "Boss" can win the State in November. To obliterate State lines and lead up to a dictatorship or an empire is evidently the purpose of the plutocracy dominating the republican party. Under this state of things the man who is ready to sell his neighbors into worse than African slavery, is an enemy to his race. If the Presidency is to be bought with millions the liberty of the subject will soon terminate.
Tacitus tells us how during the decline of the Roman empire the legions elected the emperor—choosing the aspirant giving the largest donations to the soldiers. But, soon the legions became hungry for more money, so they killed the man they had chosen to elect the next richest aspirant ready to bestow larger donations. We have already seen how a President was killed because he refused to obey the orders of two stalwart Senators. Should such spirits again prevail?
You remember that there were civil wars in Rome and that the most distinguished of the Roman emperors issued a decree commanding all people to refrain from mentioning those wars.
Now, we have the "stalwarts" writing that the South is still all "rebel." They preach the doctrine of "hate" to all the world.
The country can have peace and prosperity if Cleveland is elected, and the farmers' alliance can then close up their business in the western States. How a son of the soil, a genuine farmer can ever be made to vote the republican high tariff ticket, surprises my comprehension. Very truly yours,
