

LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this season partly cloudy and possibly showers; slightly cooler Friday morning; variable winds.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.—An adjourned meeting of the Board of Aldermen was held last night. Seven members were present.

The board was called to order about eight o'clock, and after the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Bryant, from the committee on streets, presented several reports on petitions, etc., which had been referred to them. The reports were adopted.

The appropriation bill, which had been passed by the Common Council Tuesday night, was read and their action concurred in and an hour was consumed in the reaching of other papers (most of them voluminous) which had been acted on by the lower board.

Mr. Leadbeater presented a petition of several merchants for the erection of an electric light on the strand between King and Prince streets, and explained the utility of a light in that place.

Mr. Bryant moved that the petition be referred to the committee on light, with power to act. A light should be placed at the point indicated, or anywhere along the strand, provided the capacity of the works is sufficient to run more lamps.

Mr. Burke thought the light should be placed at the street intersections. The placing of them in the middle of squares looked too much like illuminating private property.

Mr. Lindsey thought the light should be erected on the alley running from Union street to the Strand.

Mr. Hincken didn't want it placed in front of Reed's ice house.

Mr. Goodrich favored Mr. Bryant's motion.

Mr. Leadbeater explained why a light should be placed in the neighborhood of the wharves where excursion steamers landed.

Mr. Hincken believed a light at the foot of King street would answer all purposes.

Mr. Goodrich could not see how the light would be for the special benefit of anyone. It would be a public convenience.

Mr. Bryant's motion was adopted.

Mr. Leadbeater presented an ordinance directing the Superintendent of Police to have all alantus trees removed from the streets of the city by the first of next December.

He referred to the fact that such trees had been removed in other places; that they were akin to a nuisance and emitted an unpleasant odor.

Should they be removed by December time would be allowed for the planting of other trees. There had, the speaker said, been attempts made in former years to have these offensive trees removed from the streets, and he consulted several persons in regard to the matter and concluded to introduce the order.

The paper was referred to the committee on streets.

Mr. Goodrich introduced a resolution which was adopted directing the Superintendent of Police to have two crossings laid at the intersection of Lee and Cameron streets.
