CONSTITUTION CURED, PILES PREVENTED

By the death of Bishop Alexander Gregg of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Texas, whose funeral took place yesterday at Cheraw, S. C., the assistant bishop the Right Rev. George Herbert Kinsolving, will become the Bishop of Texas. Bishop Kinsolving is a native of Virginia, and is about 46 years old. He was graduated at the age of 21 years from the University of Virginia. In September, 1869, he went to Mt. Washington, Baltimore county, to teach the village school. His intention was to accumulate enough money to support himself and pay his way through a course at the theological seminary in Alexandria. This was necessary, as the war had to a great extent swept away the possessions of his family. He remained a year at the Seminary, and then returned to Mount Washington and entered upon his studies. After graduating he was called as an assistant to Rev. Dr. Thomas U. Dudley, now Bishop of Kentucky, but then the rector of Christ Protestant Episcopal Church. From Christ Church Bishop Kinsolving went to St. Mark's Church. His next call was to Cincinnati. From Cincinnati he went to the Church of the Epiphany, Philadelphia, the rectorship of which he held when elected assistant Bishop of Texas. While in Cincinnati, Bishop Kinsolving married Bishop Jagger's sister. The new bishop is 5 feet 4 inches tall. He took his seat in the House of Bishops at the general convention of the church, held in Baltimore last October. When Bishop Kinsolving was on his way to take his seat in the House of Bishops his height and black sombrero, attracted the attention of a small boy at the railroad station in Philadelphia. "Hey, mister," shouted the boy, "is you Buffalo Bill?" "No, my son," replied the newly-elected bishop. "They call me Texas George."
