Noah's Flood Not Universal.

The first week of the Catholic Summer School of America was virtually closed at Plattsburg, N. Y., yesterday. The attendance has been exceedingly gratifying, and the school in every way has been a success. This fact is in a measure due to the excellent work of the board of studies in securing for the first week such strong lecturers. Dr. Zahn, of Indiana, closed his course on "Science and Religion" yesterday morning. In his lecture "Noah's Deluge," he denied the universality of the flood, using for his argument in part, the following:

"Barring the creation of the world and of man it may be questioned if any event recorded in the Testament has given rise to more commentaries and provoked more discussion than the terrible cataclysm recorded with such minuteness and detail in the seventh chapter of Genesis. The fathers in their interpretations of the inspired volume and the schoolmen in their ponderous tomes devoted entire treatises to the consideration of the subject. With scarcely a dissenting voice the exegetists who followed them were as one regarding the universality of the catastrophe. The words of the Bible were taken literally.

"In the first place no one could any longer seriously maintain that the fossils found in the various strata of the earth's crust were deposited there by the deluge of Noah. Such a view is now regarded as simply untenable, if not absurd. The first serious objections to a universal destruction of our race came from science, and singularly enough the results of scientific discoveries proclaimed the necessity of revising the interpretation that had been in vogue regarding the destruction of the race by the deluge. It was found that there was nothing in the sacred text that forbade such a revision. What the extent of the flood was cannot be determined, but it seems to be almost certain that it was very limited, both as to the amount of territory submerged and to the number of the human race destroyed."

The second lecture was by Father Doonan and was the last in his course on "Logic." The lecturer concluded with a thought from Father Clarke, given in his "Manual of Logic."

In the evening a general reception was given to the students in the Academy Hall. To-morrow there will be given an excursion to Saranac Lake and Lake Placid.

WONDERFUL ROCKET TORPEDO.

A submarine rocket torpedo of most remarkable force and action has been tested at Newport, R. I., in the presence of the Naval Torpedo Board. It is the invention of Patrick Cunningham, a New Bedford man. It is thrown by electricity and by means of a lateral spiral screw, operated by the gas that escapes en route, is projected to a great distance.

The torpedo tried was 17 feet long and 15 inches in diameter. It was fired from a tube made of an iron water pipe, by two electric wires which ignited the rocket composition. The action of the torpedo is similar to that of a rocket in the air. The firing tube was run out so that the torpedo was a foot from the bottom and four feet below the surface. When fired, it apparently glanced from the bottom at the start, for it quickly came to the surface and for 100 to 150 feet traveled along the surface of the water, about three-quarters submerged. It then sank below the surface and continued toward the buoy, 1000 feet away, its course being marked on the surface by the bubbles from the escaping gas. After going about 800 feet the power was exhausted and the torpedo sank to the bottom. The run of 800 feet was timed in 40.3-5 seconds, and the direction was almost perfect. When fully charged the torpedo is capable of going much farther, and, presumably, for the distance, much faster.

CHOKED BY A VANISHED SNAKE.

George Fraleigh, a Danbury, Conn., farmer, 28 years old, is in danger of being choked to death by an imaginary blacksnake, and his peculiar case has puzzled the physicians who have been called to attend him. Early last Wednesday morning he went to the hay field. The hay had been gathered in heaps and Fraleigh poised a fork full above his head before he pitched it in the wagon. The men in the field saw the hay fall from the fork and cover Fraleigh. He lay writhing upon the ground and they ran to him. Coiled closely around his neck was a large blacksnake, which was slowly choking him. It took two men to uncoil the reptile's coils. When Fraleigh was released he was black in the face and almost unconscious. The snake was killed. It measured four feet. Fraleigh was badly frightened and was unable to work. The following morning, at the same hour he experienced a severe choking sensation. The next morning he had a similar experience and the attacks have continued each morning.
