COUNTY NEWS.—Mr. Frank Hume is quite sick at his home, "Warwick," in the county.

The lawn party at Ballston Tuesday was quite a success, the receipts being over \$100.

The Presbyterian Church at that place will now be handsomely painted and the lawns and trees trimmed. The church will also have a new organ.

The new brick school house at Ballston is progressing rapidly. The front is of press brick laid in black mortar. There will be two large school rooms below and a large hall above with a seating capacity of 400. This hall will be used for public meetings, concerts and school exhibitions.

At the next meeting of the Board of Supervisors steps will be taken to rigidly enforce the collection of delinquent taxes in the county. A peremptory sale of all property owing such taxes will be asked. There is much valuable land in the county upon which taxes have been delinquent for several years.

Mr. Randolph Birch has sold his farm near Arlington to Mr. George Killen. It is understood the consideration is \$1,500 an acre.

Property sales have been slow this summer, but there has been no decline in the prices asked.

Mrs. Chappelle, who was so seriously injured in a runaway some weeks ago, is slowly improving, though still confined to her bed. The other members of the party who were injured have entirely recovered.

The Misses Henley are building a handsome cottage on Fort Myer Heights. Mr. E. E. Foley is the architect and builder.

Crops in the county are suffering very much for the want of rain. The showers of yesterday morning and last night served to freshen the atmosphere, but there was not sufficient rain to materially help crops.

Mr. C. B. Munson has sufficiently recovered from his attack of inflammatory rheumatism to admit of his being out.

Primarys were held in the districts of the county Thursday night for the election of delegates to the Richmond convention. Arlington district elected Mr. J. E. Clements, who favors Col. O'Ferrall, and Washington district Mr. Charles Thompson. After his election Mr. Thompson made a strong speech against Col. O'Ferrall, arraigning him on his record as a democrat and a "gold bug." Mr. Will Douglas was called on and made a short speech, in which he congratulated the people of the South on their prosperity and stability during the present monetary flurry. Mr. Douglas also made an announcement of his candidacy for the House of Delegates.

SHERIDAN'S POINT.—During the past four or five years negotiations have been going on between the government and Mr. Julius Pelton for the purchase of the Sheridan's Point property, below this city, in Fairfax county. This point is almost directly opposite Fort Washington, and the channel of the Potomac being narrow there, with the proper fortifications placed there Alexandria and Washington would be effectually protected from hostile vessels should war with any other country take place in the future. Mr. Pelton fixed the price of the tract at \$100 per acre, but the government demurred, claiming that the price was exorbitant. Appraisers were appointed at different times, and at first placed a valuation of \$140 per acre upon the land. The government still held back, claiming the price was too steep. Other appraisers were appointed, and the last report made on the property put a price of \$150 per acre on it. The government has finally closed the bargain and paid Mr. Pelton the latter price, and the old point with its high bluff is to be strongly fortified in a short time. The place is on the line of the Mount Vernon Electric Railroad, and its fortification will stimulate private enterprise in that section of the county. When the fortifications shall have been built Sheridan's Point (or whatever it may be called in the future) will be another attraction between this city and Mount Vernon.

A NEGRO INTRUDER.—This morning a strange negro man surreptitiously entered a dwelling house on lower Duke street, and the attention of a small child having been attracted by his presence, he hid himself behind a door. The child apprized her mother of the circumstance, and the latter proceeded to make an investigation. Finding the negro behind the door, she pressed it against him with all her strength, in the hope of detaining the unwelcome visitor until help could arrive, which she had sent for by the little girl, but he managed to free himself and started to make his escape, but the lady, loth to see him get away unpunished, caught hold of one of the darkey's coat-tails, swinging on to it until he reached the front door, when he struck her hands until she was compelled to

relax her grip. The negro then made for the street and escaped, pretending as he left that he was looking for some woman in the neighborhood.

THAT MYSTERIOUS CASE.—The Manassas Gazette gives the following account of the shooting of Jack McCuen in Prince William county on Wednesday night, mention of which was made in the GAZETTE on Thursday: "Wednesday night, Jack McCuen was found lying in the village of Gainesville, badly shot in the thighs. He refused to tell who did the shooting, why it was done or anything, whatever, about it. Dr. Newman, of Haymarket, was attending physician, who, upon examination, found an operation necessary to save the life of the man, and he is doubtful of that if the weather continues warm. It is suspected by some that McCuen was shot for either a theft, or an amour." A gentleman from Prince William who was in the city to-day says that McCuen was shot by a woman with whom he had been in on intimate terms, but who on the day of the shooting had rejected his attentions.

THE MARKET was bountifully supplied with reasonable vegetables, &c., to-day and prices for most articles were considered reasonable, but wherever there was a scarcity prices advanced. Some of the country people complained that the market was overstocked, but this was only the case of a few vegetables. Prices ranged as follows: Butter 20a25c a lb; eggs 15a18c a doz; chickens 20a25c a piece; tomatoes 12a20c a peck; peppers, cayenne and cucumbers 10c a dozen; beets 3c a bunch; potatoes 25a 30c a peck; corn 10a20c a dozen; cabbage 1a5c a head; lima beans 12c a quart; string beans 6a10c a quarter peck; egg plants 2a8c a piece; apples 12a20c a peck; peaches 10a20c a quarter peck; cantaloupes 3a15c a piece; watermelons 10a25c a piece, &c. As yet there is no change in the price of fresh meats.
