BABY'S VEXING CRADLE-FELLOW.

The wife of a lumberman named Williamson a few days ago had a novel and terrifying experience with a rattlesnake. The Williamson lives near Lake Charles, La., in a small cabin on Lake Charles. Mrs. Williamson had left her 6-month-old baby asleep in its cradle, near the open door, and was going about her household business, when she happened to approach the little bed to look at her child, and to her horror saw a line of mottled green and black necked close to the form of the peacefully sleeping little one. The ugly head was raised and resting on the child's arm with its eyes keeping drowsy watch over it.

The mother sank, nearly fainting, on the floor, but with a parent's bravery realized that the snake must be dislodged at any cost to herself, as at the first or slightest movement of the babe the cruel fangs might be buried in its flesh. It was necessary also to act with speed, so arming herself with a pistol belonging to her husband, she bent over the cradle, and with one rapid gesture laid hold of the snake by the end of its tail and as suddenly gave it a jerk which landed it on the floor. The creature made at her with uplifted head, sounding its dreadful rattle as it coiled close to her feet. But, aiming steadily, she put a ball through its body, and although it again tried to attack her, she fired again and again, and succeeded in killing it. As it died it flung itself upon her foot and struck the shoe with its fang, but it was only the death agony, and the blow served only to entangle it in the tie of the shoe, to which it was still clinging when her husband reached her, having heard the shots and run to her assistance.

A VOLCANO AMIDST ICE.

News comes from Labrador of the bursting forth of a new volcano there. The steamer Windsor Lake, passing south by Cape Harrison on Friday, Aug. 4, saw an immense column of fire arising from that bold headland surmounted by a thick cloud. The ship's officers could not account for it, but on arriving at the next port the following explanation was given: The day before the men in the fishing vessels of the cape were alarmed by strange noises and reports on shore, and shortly after saw the whole top of the cliff as fire.

They landed to extinguish it, thinking it was a bushfire, but discovered a great portion of the ground had fallen, and that from this bottomless pit there was being vomited forth stones and debris while a body of flame shot up into the clouds. This sight was too much for the unsophisticated fishermen and they retreated. Many sailed away in their vessels to safer harbors. They declared the world was coming to an end, and they were badly frightened. The Windsor Lake saw the body of fire distinctly all that night as she steamed south, and it is certain no ordinary conflagration was the cause. The whole country for miles inland is perfectly barren and without trees, and the undergrowth is too scarce to cause a large fire. The country is also of volcanic origin, and therefore the sudden subterranean action resulting in volcanic eruptions is not a matter for surprise.

FIVE FATHERS' BABES CALL HIM PAPA.

With seven children calling him "papa," and six of them offspring of five fathers by his much married wife, Henry Parish is a remarkable parent. The unique family is encamped near Hunnival, Kan., awaiting the opening of the Cherokee strip. Parish became acquainted with his wife in Arkansas, where she was a comely widow of six children. The courtship, conducted principally by the women, was short, but it was not until after marriage that Parish learned that his wife had had five husbands before, and that each had left her with a baby. The first had left two babies. Parish does not seem alarmed by this fatality. But I'm am not going to go just yet. Mr. Cleveland is going to give us a good home, and my misdeeds is going to stop this foolishness of getting married. We won't have time."
