An Interesting Letter.  
Several weeks ago we had the pleasure of meeting Dr. Rogers, of the Indiana Insane Institution, while stopping a few days in Staunton, the guest of Dr. Blackford, on his way to Lexington to place two of his sons in the Virginia Military Institute. Dr. Rogers is one of the foremost specialists in the country. He has, during his \$4,000,000 in that capacity, disbursed over \$1,000,000 for the construction and improvement of the insane, and is as thoroughly familiar with the working and management of the insane hospitals of the United States as any one that could be mentioned. In view of this, the following letter, which we are permitted to publish, contains a very high compliment to the management of the hospital at this place, and will be read with interest by all who feel concern for the unfortunate who are committed to it for treatment:

Indiana Hospital for the Insane,  
Logansport, Ind., Sept. 23, 1893.  
Dear Sir: Two weeks have passed since my return home from the Valley of Virginia; but you know that an absence of even a few days from an institution involves a drawing together of a certain amount of scattered threads, which uses up both time and mental energy, so that until the present moment, the spirit has not moved me to write to you; but now, under the soothing influence of a gentle rain, which is now gladdening the mouths of the long-parched earth, I am impelled to make an effort to tell you how much I enjoyed my visit to the Staunton Hospital, and the hospitality of its officers. A more agreeable day or two I have not spent for many a long day.

Since leaving you, I have reviewed the impressions there received very frequently, with pleasurable satisfaction and benefit, professionally. In our own State, as you are aware, within the last few years, more than a million dollars has been spent in new departures for the benefit of the insane, with all of which I have been intimately associated, and I feel that I am in a position to appreciate the work that you and your colleagues have done in your institution. Your buildings recently constructed in order to expand the capacity of your hospital, are certainly very remarkable and noteworthy for their things, viz: perfect adaptability to intended use, and extraordinary economy in construction. The tendency has been in late years in this direction, but I know of no place in which excellent fitness and small cost have made such a satisfactory adjustment. To whom the credit is due, I know not, but I presume to "you all." Quoting Rev. Fred. H. Wines, of Illinois: "Certainly the time has come when a compromise must be made between the taxpayer and the lunatic," and I must say that I know of no place where this has been so justly done, to both classes, as in your new construction.

In the matter of general care and management throughout the entire institution, I wish to say, further, that I found nothing to criticize, and much to praise. Your people are well clad, clean, amused in a great variety of ways, and certainly better fed than in a majority of institutions in the land. The officers appear to me to be thoroughly competent gentlemen, and the attendants careful, conscientious, intelligent, polite and well disciplined, and I feel assured that they render to their charges kind and efficient care.

An experience of many years makes me know that none of us are perfect in our methods in this work, but I feel that you and your associates are doing a good work thoroughly well, and are imbued with an ambition which, with proper facilities, will enable you to keep pace with the most advanced progress everywhere.

FATAL DUEL OF STALLIONS.—A fatal duel between two stallions took place at Haddonfield, Pa., on Wednesday and those who witnessed the struggle say that the battle was a very fierce one. The animals were owned by Dr. C. L. Thudicum, a veterinary surgeon, and have been kept separate on account of their well-known vicious temper.

On Wednesday, however, the two horses were accidentally turned into the same field. One was partly hidden by some trees, but when the two stallions saw each other they neighed viciously and prepared for combat. Rearing upon their hind legs the enraged animals bit each other and struck out with their fore feet like professional pugilists. Their iron-shod hoofs inflicted terrible wounds. Finally, one of the stallions fell with the teeth of the other imbedded firmly in his throat. Realizing his hold, the maddened beast backed off a short distance and then, with a mighty bound, landed on the prostrate stallion with both fore feet, inflicting fatal injuries. The eyes of the victor flashed as he vanquished foe attempted to rise; but before the latter could gain his feet he was again knocked down and dragged around the field by his neck until the other stallion was beaten off with clubs. Dr. Thudicum valued the stallion that was killed at \$1000.
