A UNITED PARTY ONCE MORE.—The action of Mr. James R. Catton in declining the nomination tendered him yesterday by the convention which met at the Opera House has produced the most beneficial effect in the ranks of the Democratic party, and has served to cement its members more firmly together in one solid phalanx which, it seems, has allayed considerably the talk of independent candidates.

THE MARKET TO-DAY was well supplied with every thing in season, including quarters of "shoot," rabbit, squirrels, chestnuts, &c., the display of which shows that fall has set fairly in. The summer vegetables are holding on fairly well, and this morning fine green corn, tomatoes, beans, peas, &c., were offered on many of the benches. Fine peaches were also to be had, while there was an abundance of apples, pears, grapes, &c. Prices as a rule remain unchanged, though eggs, tomatoes and a few other articles were rather higher, while good butter could be had at from 25 to 30 cents a pound.

DEPOSED FROM HER POSITION.—Georganna Day (alias Nelson), who has for several years been charwoman at the station house at a salary of \$12 per month, was deposed from her position this morning by Mayor Strauss for drunken and disorderly conduct. Georganna had been before the Mayor on other occasions for the same offense, and had been dismissed with reprimand. Yesterday she became drunk, and while in that condition exhausted her vocabulary of cuss words on another colored woman named Mary Harris, who had also tarried too long with the wine.

CORPORATION COURT.—Judge J. K. M. Norton presiding.—Continuation of yesterday's proceedings.—Hewes's administrator vs. Hewes's administrator; jury unable to agree and case continued. The case of Clarence Rone, colored, and Virginia Meade, indicted for the murder of Ed. Meade, set for trial on Monday, was continued till the January term. No business was transacted in the Court to-day.

ASSAULT.—A row occurred on the Hill, in the southwestern section of the city, last night, among a number of colored men, during which John King was assaulted and badly beaten by Frank Wanzler, Henry Baker, John Green and Chas. Hodge. King, after being badly beaten, was left in the road at the corner of Washington and Franklin streets, where he was found in an exhausted condition some time afterwards. To-day the offenders were arrested and locked up in the station house.

NOT TRUE.—The report in circulation about the wharves yesterday to the effect that the schooner John Franklin had been blown ashore during the storm last week and that the crew, including Messrs. John Hendley and Jack Ashton, had been drowned, was untrue. The schooner is safe, and both Messrs. Hendley and Ashton arrived here this morning.

SAID HE HAD BEEN ROBBED.—A man who gave his name as Walter E. Harzell appeared at the station house last night and reported that he had been robbed of \$178 and a gold watch or had lost the same near the local depot. Harzell did not reappear at the station house this morning, and it is not known whether he recovered his property or not.

LOCAL BREVITIES. The populists will hold a meeting at the Opera House to-night. Mr. John Lyles, an old resident of Fairfax, died at the Infirmary yesterday. A resident of north Fairfax street yesterday evening fell from the top of his front door steps to the street and badly cut his head. The game of football between the 21 St. John's and 21 Washington High School this morning resulted in favor of the latter by 16 to 0. The station at Clark's Gap, W. & O. R. R., has been closed, last Sunday being the final day of business. Freight, &c., for that point will be landed at Picoian Springs. It is understood that charges of neglect of duty have been preferred against one of the corporation officers, and that an investigation into the charges will be made by the Mayor next week. The farmers on the opposite side of Hunting creek have constructed an approach to the electric railway bridge, and they now come to this city over that bridge now that the old Hunting creek bridge has been washed away. A little boy named Herbert Rawlinson fell from his stilts this morning and a deep gash was cut in his leg by a nail in one of the stilts. He was taken to Mr. Creighton's drug store, where his wounds were dressed by Mr. Frank Wardfield. Anderson Vernon, an old and respected colored citizen, and who before the war was a slave of Maj. Drewry, on his James river estate, died at his home last night. For a number of years he had been a well-known stevedore on the wharves.
