Brokers Play Football.

Four little boys in blue caused a good deal of trouble on the New York Stock Exchange Wednesday afternoon.

They were in the gallery shortly before 'Change closed, and they wore military suits. They had long military coats and bright gold lace on their hats, and they had just come down from boarding school. They were on their way home to spend Thanksgiving.

They came into the gallery of the Exchange just as quietly and modestly as any boys would; but when the old brokers looked up and saw them, they recalled the old days when they, too, went to boarding school, and when life was pleasant to them. One of the boys, not abashed by the prominence of his place, yelled out something about Yale and Princeton, and the old war horses on the Exchange, who in early days had fought many a Rugby game, felt a new inspiration, and one of the head devils in this new inspiration was Dick Halsted. He sent out messengers to buy all the footballs in the neighborhood. The messengers on the Stock Exchange are well paid and they move quickly, and by fifteen minutes of 3 Mr. Halsted had twenty footballs, fully blown up and ready for use. He distributed them, and in an instant the great room of the Exchange was dotted with flying footballs.

Halsted was the moving spirit in the whole business, and the four little boys in blue up in the gallery grinned as they saw this old-timer pass the footballs to his friends and urge them on to all sorts of high kicking. Halsted's first lieutenant was Allison Hopkins, one of the fair-faced young men of the Exchange, and a roaring high kicker. Behind him came Talbot T. Taylor, James K. Keene's son-in-law, and following in quick procession were H. P. Brookman, Edmund Fish, Charles Rutsanna, John Wallace, the Lachawanna specialist; John Henry Clews, the roly-poly member of that family, Ed La Montaigne, Charley Andrews, A. V. de Goicoirca, Dave Lapsley, Sam and Dan Chaucery, Richmond Terminal Quick, all the Hunter boys, and last, but by no means least, Emery Hodges.

Mr. Hodges in the old days was one of the finest sports of the Exchange, but some of his friends got to work and elected him governor, and after that he became too severe to live. He was so strict that the boys of the Exchange began to call him the Inspector, and one day they dressed up an employee of the Exchange in the garb of an Inspector of the Police and tacked on to him the placard, "This is the Inspector." Wednesday Mr. Hodges was out of office, and he kicked up more merriment than all the others put together.

The twenty footballs were kicked into the air, they were kicked into the galleries, and they were kicked into that famous chandelier which is at the top of the dome of the Exchange. Even those four little boys in blue in the gallery were amazed at the tremendous effort. They gauged the distance from the floor to the chandelier, and it was with astonishment that they saw that these old-time fellows, who left college years ago, had force enough to send those footballs into that chandelier and smash the electric tubes and the porcelain lining. But this was done, and the fragments of the chandelier and the porcelain lining rained down on the brokers.

During the melee William Euclid Young, who believes that he wears the finest bevelled hat in the town, got in the way of one of the kickers, and that hat was a sight to see afterward. All this time Chairman James Mitchell, up on the rostrum, was banging away with his gavel trying to be stern. The old boys of the Exchange didn't care any more for his gavel than they did for a straw in a mint julep. But Mr. Mitchell didn't make any record of the fines and after 'Change the boys attempted to settle up in another way. The four little boys in blue in the gallery then went home to see their papas and mammas and told them that they had seen the finest football game imaginable.—N. Y. Sun.
