TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES

The trial of Prendergast, the assassin of Mayor Harrison, of Chicago, was postponed to-day till Wednesday.

The first race at Bennings to-day was 4-1-2 furlongs. Torchbearer won; Hartford, second; Brocade filly, third. Time, 56 seconds.

In the French Chamber of Deputies to-day a proposal that general amnesty should be granted to all political, press and strike offenders was defeated by a vote of 226 to 257.

The unveiling of the Mary Washington monument, at Fredericksburg, Va., will not take place the first week in December as was originally intended, but will occur in April or May. The shaft will be there next week.

The bronze statue of Roscoe Conkling, at the corner of Madison avenue and 23d street, New York, was unveiled yesterday without the slightest ceremony. There was no assembly of people, no word of eulogy, no note of music.

Henry Miles, 60 years old, shot Mrs. Anna M. Ward in the back at a farm house, in Jefferson county, N. Y., yesterday, killing her instantly. With the assistance of a neighbor he carried the body into the house and laid it on her bed. Mrs. Ward had purchased his farm under mortgage foreclosure and he was driven by a desire for revenge and jealousy to kill her. Miles is in jail.

Over a foot of snow has fallen in Buffalo, N. Y., and the surrounding country since Saturday night. The Lehigh strikers are delighted at the prospect of a snow-blizzard which, they say, added to the incompetency of the green men will completely paralyze traffic. Another batch of new men arrived from the west yesterday and were sent east.

The National League for the protection of American institutions, known as the A. P. A., will issue a manifesto in New York this afternoon. The league claims that the manifesto is aimed at a concerted movement of the Catholic Church for a share of the public school funds.

At Corsicana, Tex., last night a grain elevator containing 25,000 bushels of wheat, two live, stables, thirty-five horses, three freight cars, the electric plant and six other buildings were destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

John DeLino was killed by electricity in Sing Sing prison at 11:43 to-day. DeLino shot and killed Mrs. Catharine Gessel, an Italian woman, a year ago in a tenement house in Brooklyn. His death was instantaneous.

Edward Cady, aged 35, killed his two children at Erie, Pa., this morning and put a bullet in his own brain. Cady was a morphine fiend.

Another big gas well was struck in the west of Seneca, N. Y., Saturday night, the flow of which is estimated at one million feet per day.
