A Dollar a Day. I propose to give some hints as to how one family lives on \$1 a day for table expenses.

This family consists of three adults (one a servant) and a child of 10, and in the matter of visitors averages at least one additional adult. I shall naught extenuate and naught set down in malice. Very little pastry or cake is indulged in. The most rigid economy is practiced without meanness. Flour is purchased by the barrel, and bread baked at home. Whole wheat and Graham flour is bought by the bag at barrel rates. Your grocer will always give you this advantage. Much cornmeal is used in the shape of cornbread, Johnny cake, pone, and fried mush.

The staple drink is chocolate, of which one pound generally lasts a month, as it is most partaken of by the whole family. Either tea or coffee is used at least once a day besides. Two pounds of coffee and one of tea is the allowance per month, which they either exceed or fall short of as the tastes of the family fluctuate, for they do have very fluctuating tastes. Lard is never purchased for frying, and butter is never thought of for such a purpose. Soup is served daily. This is a matter of economy as well as taste. Rice and macaroni are purchased in large quantities. Tomatoes are the only canned goods indulged in, with the exception of fruits put up at home.

A joint, such as a leg of mutton or a roast of beef, weighing from eight to ten pounds, is only indulged in on Sunday when visitors are expected; on Sunday preferably, because it leaves little cooking to do on Monday, which is always a consideration in families where the help consists of one maid of all work. Every particle of such joints is turned to account. The fat is tried out for frying, the bones furnish soup for one or two days, the tiny scraps that cannot be sliced to make a good appearance either cold or in ragouts are made into minces, beef balls, or croquettes. In short nothing is wasted. The secret of living well—rather handsomely, in fact—on \$1 per day consists in marketing well, economy and looking out for the left-over.

I am not going to make myself a slave to a few cold potatoes or a handful of beef bones," said a lady with whom I was talking on this subject, and who spends no more than the sum mentioned above, but with this difference: A soup is never on her table, a croquette or a salad is an unheard-of luxury; a piece of meat is always cooked in the same way; the bones go to the nourishing of an ugly dog; nothing is made the most of. There are none of those pleasant little surprises which an enterprising housekeeper who takes delight in catering for her family will occasionally have in store for them, and I really think this sort of management manifests itself in the character of the family, who are as unenterprising, as unenthusiastic, and as commonplace as the dinners with which they are served.

One of the heaviest expenses was \$7 a month for three quarts of milk per day. This, it was found, might be curtailed by purchasing two quarts per day and using condensed milk for tea or coffee; two cans per week, at 12 cents per can, making a difference of about \$1.25 per month. Many families would not require such a large quantity of milk, but they are "cranks" on the subject of milk and do not believe in substituting themselves in this item. It is stinging themselves and the house (and his whines are so few and inoffensive that they deserve indulgence) that chocolate should be made with milk, instead of half milk and half water, and this alone takes from three girls to a quart of milk daily, according as to whether one or more members use it.

If one lives in the country, where eggs and poultry can be furnished for the cost of producing, and where fresh vegetables can be grown in the garden, at least \$50 may be deducted from this sum of \$365 per year for "meat which perisheth."

A cuisine run on this plan must have the strict and even watchful attention of the mistress. She must do her own marketing. It took the rigid economist of whom I am writing at least six months to break in the servant to the wholesome economy practiced in her family.

She had to learn that oatmeal, rice and all cereals must be cooked so that at least a sixth of the quantity did not remain burned and sticking to the bottom of the saucepan, to the ruination of both food and vessel. That the least amount of cold cereal was not to be thrown away. Tiny slices of fresh mush cranberry or wheatena—indeed of any of the breakfast cereals—make a tempting little garnish to a steak. A spoonful or two of mashed potatoes mixed with bread crumbs and savory seasonings is another tasteful garnish for any sort of broiled or warmed meats.

The cold dressing from poultry, be it never so little, made into balls proportioned to the quantity, and served out in a neat little tin, with the least bit of tomato sauce, will quite change the character of the dish.

It is not absolutely necessary to use a double boiler, which often takes more time and too often results in half cooked meals. Use a granite saucepan that has never been burned; have the water rapidly boiling, salt it,
