COLONEL STARBERRY FAIRFAX.

Some lunatic and practical joker has been annoying the proudest dames and dowagers of Washington, and from letters and telegrams that have been received here it would seem that he has done the same with prominent ladies in other cities. He signs himself Col. Starberry Fairfax, but that name does not appear in the directory, nor is it known to any of the Virginians or Kentuckians who would be likely to have an acquaintance with such a person if he existed. His letter reads: "North American Lecture Bureau, Western Division," but he gives no street or town address, and if any one wanted to answer him, he would not know where to direct the envelope. The letters are all uniform and read as follows:

"Dear Madam:—The constant expression of sympathy which is manifested throughout the country for that distinguished but martyred statesman of Kentucky, the Hon. W. C. P. Breckinridge, suggests that the people of the land should have an opportunity of hearing his eloquent defense of religion and morality. In response to vehement calls from women of America it has been deemed wise to place him upon the lecture platform. It is intended to have him lecture in the principal cities under the auspices of a board of national patronesses, one representative lady from each principal city constituting that board. Your name has been suggested for the lady of Albany, and unless we hear from you to the contrary by the morning of the 21st inst., it will be printed as a member of the National Board on all the programmes and show bills throughout the country. I leave for the West on Wednesday morning. Thanking you in advance for your courtesy, I remain your most obedient servant."

Very naturally the ladies who have received this communication, and they are among the social leaders of Washington, have been thrown into a state of panic, particularly as the writer threatens to accept silence as assent, and does not tell where a refusal will reach him. It is not believed that Col. Breckinridge has anything to do with the affair, but it is supposed to be the work of some wicked wag. Any person knowing of the existence of Colonel Starberry Fairfax would do a great favor by reporting that fact to the husbands of some of the ladies who have received this letter and inform them of his whereabouts.—Chicago Record.

BUYING BATTLEFIELDS.

The United States government is engaged to some extent in buying battlefields of the late war to convert into national parks. As yet, however, we have observed no disposition on its part to purchase any field on which its troops met with defeat. Perhaps it may do this later on. If so we know several fields in Virginia worthy of the government's attention—fields where there were large numbers of men engaged, where the losses were very heavy, and where great valor and strategy were displayed. Among these are Manassas, Cold Harbor, Fredericksburg, Chancellorsville, the Wilderness, &c. We have doubts, however, whether the Grand Army of the Republic in which most of these schemes originated will ever urge the purchase of any of these battlefields. But there is a field in Virginia where they won the conclusive triumph of war, and which, from their standpoint, even might well be acquired for a national park. The field of Appomattox. We believe that northern and southern sentiment would command a movement for the purchase of it by the United States government.

We know none of the owners of the property; we are ignorant of their names ever; we do not speak in their interests; but in the interest of the great American public, which has been shocked by the spectacle of a high technicalities to continue a wrong, to defend a palpable blunder made in extinguishing the name of the field. Besides, as we say, Appomattox is a field which will live in history. It will be written of when the names of most other fields have been forgotten. It is dear to the recollection of all those that mustered there whether under Lee or Grant. The Confederate who possesses a parole issued at Appomattox has a thing which money cannot buy; a thing which he wants handed down to his latest posterity, and the Federal soldiers hold Appomattox as dear. There, indeed, were the noblest qualities of both armies manifested. There the American soldier displayed himself in the best advantage. Richmond Dispatch.
