WEATHER PROBABILITIES.—For this section fair, slight changes in temperature; westerly winds, becoming easterly.

STEAMBOAT NOTES.—The handsome passenger steamer Newport News, built at Newport News for the Norfolk and Washington Steamboat Company, was turned over to her owners to-day. She will be put into service at once, coming to Washington to-morrow in company of the steamer Norfolk, which went to Newport News this morning to be repaired. The Norfolk will relieve the Washington Wednesday and the latter vessel will go into the dry dock for a thorough overhauling.

A party of Washington capitalists has secured an option on the steamer Kent from the Baltimore, Chesapeake and Atlantic Railway Company. A representative of the Washingtonians has had the steamer hauled out at Baltimore to inspect her hull, which was found to be in excellent condition. The engines were also tested and it is reported that the sale will be consummated in a few days. The intended purchasers propose to put the Kent into the excursion business between Washington and landings on the Potomac river. The Kent is a sister vessel to the Samuel J. Pentz, which is now used as an excursion steamer on the Potomac.
