A DUEL WITH DYNAMITE.

A dispatch from Rico, Col., says: One
of the most desperate duels that ever
occurred was fought on Wednesday at
the Rico-Aspen mine, between the
forces of that company and the men of
the Enterprise, who work the adjoining
property. There has not been the best
of feeling between the two forces since
a former encounter three years ago,
when several were killed and a number
wounded.

Both mines Wednesday had forces in
their tunnels, when a blast broke
through the intervening wall and the
rivals were face to face.
Like furies they sprang at one an-
other and began the fight with drills,
hammers and shovels. In the confined
space they found they could not do ef-
fective work with such clumsy instru-
ments, and beyond a few heads broken
there was no possibility of harm.

This did not suit the miners, who felt
deeply the interest of their em-
ployees. The foremen resorted to an
old trick which had given the victory
once before. The men were ordered
back on both sides.
Then with the natural weapon of the
miner they began a duel to the death
that threatened to blow up the mine
and entomb the combatants in the de-
bris. From shelter the men fired dynamite
cartridges into the ranks of the
opposing forces wherever a head or
limb was exposed. The volleys were
rapid and fearful in their detonation,
hurling vast masses of rock from the
roof and sides of the mine.

Two men of the Rico-Aspen were se-
riously injured. One is said to have
had his shoulder blown off and the
other was retired with blindness and
several dislocations.

After the fight had raged for an hour
the superintendents on the surface got
wind of the fight, hastily armed some
of their reliable men with rifles and
went to the place.
Their rifles served to make peace be-
tween the belligerents, and the rivals
were driven to the surface, leaving
guards at the disputed point.

The Rico-Aspen Company has a main
office in Denver, and branch offices in
New York and Philadelphia. It owns
five mining claims, known as the Vestal
Group, near Rico, directly south
and adjoining the Enterprise property.
The companies have been in the
courts for similar causes and the end
lines of the two corporations have been
a constant subject of dispute with the
men employed.

VIRGINIA'S COLONIAL EXHIBIT.—At
the request of the Colonial Committee
of the Cotton States' Exposition, at
Atlanta, Governor O'Ferrall appointed
three ladies to represent Virginia.—
Mrs. Annie S. Greene, of Culpeper;
Mrs. Hugh Nelson Page, of Norfolk,
and Mrs. Mary Stuart Smith, of the
University, compose this committee.
They are empowered by the governor
as an executive board, each member
having the power to appoint sub-
committees in different localities through-
out the State. Mrs. Greene is at pre-
sent in Staunton for this purpose. The
design is to build a hall where each State
will have a distinct section in
which to make its own display. The
idea for this national hall origina-
ted with Mrs. Greene, who laid
it before the Atlanta board, and
it was at once enthusiastically
adopted. Mrs. Peale, chairman
of the board of the colonial committee
of the Atlanta Exposition, en route to
Europe in the interests of the exposition,
laid the plan before the New York
board, whereupon Mrs. Governor Mor-
ton, in the interest of New York, sub-
scribed \$4,000 towards it. The board
of Massachusetts has also signified its
intention of subscribing liberally.

A circular letter has been addressed
to the governors of all the States by the
Atlanta board asking united action in
the matter. It is in order now for Vir-
ginia to do her part and co-operate
cordially with those appointed to assist
in the collection of souvenirs and relics
for a creditable showing of their State
and section. The most treasured arti-
cles may be safely sent, as they will be
most carefully handled and transported
free of charge both ways. The exhibi-
tion hall is to be fire-proof and under-
ground night and day, besides at all
times under the careful supervision of
the colonial committee.—Staunton Post.
