

SENATOR GIBSON ON HIS DEFEAT.—Senator Gibson came to Washington yesterday evening to find a few days' rest after the labors of his campaign. He was not disposed to be very communicative over the crushing defeat of his party, and the resultant blasting of his hopes for a return to the Senate.

"Will you make any effort to obtain the complimentary nomination of the Democrats for the senatorship?" he was asked.

"At the slightest," he replied. "It is indifferent to me who gets the complimentary nomination."

"Do you intend, then, to retire from politics?"

"By no means. I propose to stay right in politics. I am not one of those who withdraw simply because they cannot always have their own way. I will take my place in the ranks of my party, along with the privates, and continue to fight its battles so long as my efforts can be of any avail. I believe the time will come when Senator Gorman will be fully vindicated, and I propose to be uniting in my labors to help to bring that vindication about."

SIX WIVES AND 21 CHILDREN.—Thomas May, of East Greenwick, R. I., had twenty-one children and six wives, all of whom lived at different times in his one house. He is dead, and his sixth wife wants his estate for the support of herself and the youngest four children.

Isaac Wadleigh, May's executor and son-in-law, objects to this, as the will made by May gave the property to the children of a favorite wife, who died some years ago.

When the litigation over May's will came before the Supreme Court on appeal Monday, it was shown that May was about sixty-five when he died, and that he married young on an elopement. His wife dying, he married a woman, from whom he was divorced. Another wife died and another was divorced. Then one other died, and the sixth, according to the letters which were introduced into court, was distrusted and disinherited.

A BANQUET OF FLOWERS.—A pleasing adjunct to the chrysanthemum show was the annual chrysanthemum banquet of the Philadelphia Florists' Club, which was given at Dooner's Hotel last evening. The club is a most important factor in horticultural circles, and the banquet has become a marked feature of the social life of the florists, coming as it does, as a delightful relaxation after the months of worry and attention necessary to produce the novelties and perfections in the chrysanthemum for the exhibition.

Robert Kift, the newly-elected president of the club, presided, but was almost totally concealed behind a great vase full of lovely "Queen" chrysanthemums, quantities of the favorite flower being also liberally scattered about the dining hall, with a background of stately palms.

PACING RACE FAILURE.—The race between the two great pacers, John R. Gentry and Joe Patchen, at the Richmond exposition yesterday evening, under the auspices of the Richmond Riding and Driving Club, was a disappointment. Only 1,000 spectators were present and the track was very heavy. First mile, 2:15; second 2:14. Gentry slipped his boot in the first heat, and went around with it under his foot. In making the short turn on the half-mile track he several times struck the spokes of his sulky, which frightened him. Mr. Scott, his half owner, who drove him, said he had never been on a half-mile track, and said he was handicapped to such an extent that he withdrew him at the end of the second heat.

Patchen then went another mile in an exhibition race with a running mate and made it in 2:11.

ANTHRACITE COAL.—A vein of anthracite coal has been discovered at

Cherry Run, in Morgan county, W. Va. This discovery has an important bearing on the Augusta county coal field, as it goes a long way towards proving the claim that the anthracite measures are continuous from the Pennsylvania fields to the Dora mines at Mt. Solon. The Cherry Run vein is about midway between the Pennsylvania mining district and the Dora opening, and in the same mountain range, consequently offers the best evidence yet adduced as to the continuity of these coal measures from the northern extremity at least as far south as North River Gap, in this county.—Yost's (Stanton) Weekly.
