ROMEO AND JULIET.—An extraordinary love tragedy, recalling the story of Romeo and Juliet, is reported from Alford, Irma. Some time ago the daughter of a highly-respected family made the acquaintance of an employee of the local administration, whose uncle is one of the princes of the Hungarian Church. The two fell deeply in love, and often met by stealth, as the young man's parents could not forget a law suit they had had with the girl's family, and which was decided against them. The girl's father, who was once a millionaire, but whom speculation had reduced, tried to persuade his daughter to marry a rich landowner who was anxious to make her his wife. The young man succeeded, however, in getting a dispensation through his clerical uncle, and a secret marriage was performed.

A week ago the girl's parents again made a violent scene to induce her to marry the landowner. She took their words so much to heart that she took a large dose of opium, and next morning was found unconscious in her bed. The young husband, hearing the news, ran to the house, and in the general confusion entered her room. Seeing her pale and motionless, and believing her to be dead, he blew his brains out with a revolver he had brought with him. The report woke the young woman, whom the opium had held in a trance. When she saw her lover lifeless on the ground near her she took the revolver from his dead hand and shot herself.—London Daily News.

A MOTHER-IN-LAW IN THE WAY.—William F. Watson, of Philadelphia, has been compelled to get a writ of habeas corpus, in order to get an interview with his wife. When he reached Detroit a few days ago he found that his mother-in-law was determined to keep him out of the house and away from her daughter, and he applied to Lawyers Griffin and Warner, who obtained a writ of habeas corpus. The petitioner showed that he and Jennie Leonard Watson were married in Detroit on October 23, 1894, and that they went to Philadelphia to live, where they remained until November 21 last. At that time Mrs. Watson and her child, accompanied by the former's mother, Mrs. Ella Murphy, returned to Detroit. He says that Mrs. Murphy and her husband, Thos. Murphy, who is the proprietor of the Murphy Iron Works, and Mrs. Watson's stepfather, illegally restrained his wife and child of their liberty.

Before the case was called before Judge Lillibridge, Mr. Watson found he would be able to induce his wife to return with him to Philadelphia, if he were permitted to talk to her free of restraint on the part of her mother; but he was mistaken, and had to return to Philadelphia alone. It seems that domestic troubles caused Mrs. Watson voluntarily to leave her husband.

SUGAR AND MULE.—When the army surrendered at Lynchburg and Col. R. M. Stribling mounted a cannon and told his men the fight was over, each one made for a mule or horse to ride home. Mr. R. S. Moore and another man got hold of the same mule, but the man claiming a first lien on it, Mr. Moore compromised by taking the saddle with which he trudged for some distance when he came to a man, with his head and body in a sugar barrel scraping off what hung to the staves with a fine mule standing behind him. He gently placed his saddle on the mule and mounting him, rode away. When at a safe distance he looked back and the man was still engrossed in scraping the sugar. Mr. Moore rode the mule home and cultivated a crop of corn with it, but has never ceased to wonder what the man thought and said when he took his head out of the barrel and found his mule gone.—Warrenton Virginian.
