BEHEADED WHILE ALIVE.

The most sensational testimony yesterday in the case of Scott Jackson, on trial in Cincinnati, O., for the murder of Pearl Bryan, was that of Dr. Robert Caruthers, who conducted the post mortem. He stated that in his opinion the girl was beheaded while yet alive.
Mr. and Mrs. Alexander S. Bryan, of Green Castle, Ind., and all the members of their family attended the trial yesterday. They had hardly been seated when an officer brought into court and placed in front of the witness stand a lady figure, dressed in the wrapper that Pearl Bryan wore at the time of her death. The garment was a grewsome sight, covered as it was, in part, with the stains of mud and blood.
The defense objected to the exhibition as highly reprehensible, and was sustained by the court. The figure was then removed and the dress thrown on a table.

Corner Tingley then identified the clothing. It consisted of a wrapper with small blue check figures, navy blue undershirt, suit of underwear, black stockings, shoes and rubbers, gloves and hairpins.
The parents of the murdered girl wept at the sight of the clothes.
Mrs. Mabel Stanley, of Green Castle, sister of Pearl Bryan, identified the clothing on the table as having belonged to Pearl.
Joseph E. Percy, a druggist, of Green Castle, was called to the witness stand. He testified that the pocketbook found in Scott Jackson's valise was the one he sold Pearl Bryan January 23.

Wore Tights and a Breastpin.

May C. Standish, an actress, obtained a verdict of \$300 before Justice O'Dwyer of the city court of New York, on Saturday, against William A. Brady, for breach of contract by which she was employed to act in the "Clemenceau Case." She sued for \$510, claiming that she had been engaged for the season of 1891-92 at \$30 a week, and was dismissed at the end of twelve weeks. She had played the part of Georgette and Mme. Lesbron, but they wanted her to understand for the part of Mme. Clemenceau and Iza. She objected that she was not employed to play these parts. She would not play Mme. Clemenceau because she was not in old woman's parts and she would not play Iza, because it was necessary to appear as if nude. The part had been played by Sybil Johnson and created much talk on its production.

"Why did you not play the part of Iza?" she was asked by Lawyer Hummel, for the plaintiff.
"Because she had to appear without any clothes on, and I was not engaged to play that part, and would not play it anyway," she replied.
Brady testified that the plaintiff was engaged to play in any part assigned to her. He said that Sybil Johnson had worn full tights in the part.
"Tights and a breastpin?" interposed Mr. Hummel.
"I don't know much about the breastpin," returned the witness; "I know she wore tights."
Brady said that William C. Newell was his partner in the piece. Miss Standish said that Newell wrote to her that he was a partner, but she did not believe him, as he had "fibbed" to her before. Miss Standish was a widow at the time, but has since remarried.


