A PROPHECY OF EVIL.

A Bavarian in the United States forty years ago was moved to prophesy by what he saw here. He published his prophecy in the *General Gazette* in Augsburg, a newspaper which is given still to forecasting dire disaster to most persons and things in this republic. The prophet of 1857 was concerned especially about New York City, which he felt sure would dwindle away in the twentieth century to the proportions of long ago. The whole of Manhattan Island would disappear by earthquake, and only the outskirts of the metropolis would be left. The twentieth century would also witness the wiping out of western Cuba, Havana, Florida and lower California. The twenty fifth President of the United States would be the last President of the republic, as after the year 1900 this country would be split in six parts, with San Francisco, Salt Lake City, New Orleans, St. Louis, Washington and Boston as the capitals. It will be seen from this list that the prophet did not foresee the rise of Chicago, or, if he did, didn't think it worth mentioning.

Contrary to the custom of latter-day foreign prophets, this Bavarian failed to concentrate all the misfortune of the future upon the United States. Italy and France were to be obliterated from the map; Berlin was to be swallowed up. Soon after the end of the century, he predicted, England would become a republic and Ireland a kingdom. Those who are inclined to sneer at the abilities of the prophet may be edified by the statement that several of his forecasts for this century proved correct. He foretold every one of the great wars that shook Europe from 1858 to 1872, the fall of Napoleon, the riots of the Commune, and the occupation of the German throne by three emperors within a year.

The Bavarian foresaw the assassination of a President of the United States in the present century, but whether that President was Lincoln or Garfield cannot be surmised, as he gave no near hint as to the year of the crime. Remarkably enough, he did not have an inkling of what would happen in 1861, although he could foretell events a quarter of a century later; for instance, his prophecy does not contain a word regarding the great civil war in the United States.

LETTER FROM FAUQUIER.

MARSHALL, Va., Jan. 15.—The patrons of the GAZETTE cordially send greetings for the "new year" to the faithful editors and will add the hope that they may live to celebrate the centenary of their valuable newspaper, being read now tri-weekly by the fourth generation of the writer's family in America and then sent to Anglo-Saxon relatives in England and Scotland, while in return are received nearly every week the Portsmouth Times, the Scotsman, the Navy and Army, London Illustrated News, and the Engineer—as Christmas reading.

We rejoice to read the sprightly notices that dear old Alexandria is recovering the trade from the Shenandoah and bordering counties and travel as well. Since the railroad authorities have made the change travel has increased tenfold. The scene at our depot at Marshall is a lively one. Lately immense logs of walnut wood, some weighing two tons, have been shipped to England. The smaller traffic in live stock, poultry and eggs, carried on by our thrifty housewives and farmers of Warren, Fauquier, Prince William and other counties along the route is immense. The police conductor, Captain Payne, however, sometimes demurs to stop very long, and perhaps, as is said, may be tempted to use an exclamation not in keeping with the decalogue, certain it is, a respectable depot building is needed at Marshall to accommodate the crowds of travelers who now have only a couple of old cars to shelter them.

The friends here of Dr. Bedford Brown, many of whom were his patients in anti-bellum times, are glad to learn that he returned from his late trip to the City of Mexico in safety. Since we have received a copy of the paper which the doctor read while there before the second Pan-American Congress on the "Fever of the south Atlantic States and their treatment." During the present week quite a number of cases of la grippe, pneumonia and scarlet fever have occurred. Mrs. Hiel, a most estimable member of the Episcopal Church, died on Tuesday.

A KENTUCKY ROMANCE.—A romantic wedding took place in the mountains of eastern Kentucky, near Kentucky and Virginia line, Saturday night. In 1865 Joe Black, a young man of local prominence, was married, and his marriage not being a happy one in 1887, he was divorced. Black went to Texas, and a few months later his grass widow married Thomas Stanhope. Three years ago Stanhope died. Black prospered in Texas, and remained single, and, in his old age, returned a few months ago to the scenes of his childhood. It was here that he met Lillian Stanhope, living on a small farm on Rockhouse Branch. Lillian was his sweetheart in his boyhood, and was his divorced wife. Amid these scenes the old love was rekindled, each forgave and forgot, and they finally decided to marry again. The ceremony was performed Saturday night. Black is seventy-seven and Lillian Stanhope seventy-nine. They have begun life over again, and will live on the farm close to the scene of early days.
