A CRAZY MOTHER KILLS HER BABE.

There was arraigned in Adams Street Court, in New York, on Saturday, a demented woman, a beautiful young mother, who had killed her baby son because she thought she was called upon to make a sacrifice. She is Mrs. Annie Noe. Her wrist was bandaged where she had slashed it in an attempt to kill herself and her face was pale and emaciated. By her side was her husband, Charles Noe, anxious and solicitous of her welfare, and her older children.

But the court proceedings were to her so much empty form. She gazed around the court-room with wild eyes, never realizing that the charge against her was murder. To her it was only a sacrifice; a sacrifice she had been called upon to make by God, just as Abraham had been called upon to sacrifice his own son to the Lord. Mrs. Noe's crime was the outcome of religious fervor and despondency. She wanted to die, because she thought her life was a hard one but she could not bear to leave her baby behind for another woman to tend, for another woman, perhaps, to treat unkindly. She brooded over imaginary troubles until she firmly believed that her husband was unkind to her, that the care of life and of her family were more than she could bear. She became so thoroughly imbued with this idea that she spoke to her neighbors about it, and told them how she must put an end to it. Although it was unbalanced, no effort was made to watch her or to prevent the tragedy she contemplated, and talked so freely about.

She dressed her baby, George, Friday, in an unusual array of finery. His clothing was principally of lace, and he looked so handsome. The mother then took him out to visit friends, by whom both boy and clothes were greatly admired. At noon Mrs. Noe returned to her home and lunched; then she sent her four eldest children out to play on the street, while she stripped little George of his finery. She gave the baby a warm bath, and then dressed him again in all his finery. George was tired after a morning spent in making calls and the unusual bath, and as soon as he was clothed again he went right to sleep with one little pink arm tucked under his face and the other one crossed over his breast.

When the mother went to a bureau, where her husband kept a pistol. She pointed it at the little hand on the baby's breast and fired. She had wrapped the pistol in some bedclothes to leaden the report. The baby gave one convulsive jump and fell back on to the bed. A great hole had been torn in its hand and the bullet had gone through its chest, just missing the heart. George was not dead, but his mother thought her work had been thorough. She then went into the kitchen and drew a butcher's knife across her left wrist, cutting all the arteries; then she lay down on the bed beside her mangled baby. When her husband, who is foreman of a pork-packing establishment, returned home, he was met on the street by his six-year-old boy, who lisped, importantly:

"Pop, mamma's shotted baby."
Noe rushed upstairs and found his wife sitting in a chair tearing out her hair in her wrist with her fingers.
Noe saw the body on the bed, and said to the woman:
"Annie, what have you done?"
"I was called upon to sacrifice my baby because you were unkind to me, and I wanted to die."

The police were called in, and the baby was taken to Long Island College Hospital, where it died soon after darkness set in that night. The mother was locked up in Adams street station, when the wound in her wrist was sewn up. She smiled peacefully. Neighbors say that Noe was a most considerate husband, who gave his wife everything she needed. She was of a most morose and despondent disposition, and her principal grievance was that she could have no assistance for her household.
