CONSTITUTION OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH.  
After nearly six years of labor the joint commission appointed by the general convention of the Episcopal Church, in 1892, for the purpose of revising the constitution and canons of the church, has completed its task, and it submitted yesterday copies of its report to the delegates to the general convention to be held in Washington next October.  
The joint commission consists of the Bishops of Albany, Kentucky, Chicago, Quincy, New York and Maryland, the Rev. E. A. Hoffman, Rev. Dr. F. S. Stone, Dr. Richards, Rev. Dr. Hall Harrison, Rev. P. Davenport, Rev. J. H. Eccleston and the Rev. Dr. William R. Huntington and Messrs. Lightner, Bradford, Swayne, Saunders, Beall, Miller and Laidley.  
The document is perhaps one of the most important in the history of the American Episcopal Church, and its revisions are likely to excite no end of discussion in the sessions of the general conference before they will be placed on the statute books of the church; in fact, opposition to several of the proposed amendments was manifested in the deliberations of the commission and several members have put themselves on record as dissenting opinion to this or that proposition.  
One of the subjects which is likely to stir up strife in the church at large is the revision of the canon on marriage which forbids the marriage of either party to a divorce during the life time of the other. This is opposed to the existing law of the church in this country, which permits the marriage of the innocent party in a divorce for the cause of adultery.  
To the provisions of section three, prohibiting any minister from marrying divorced persons, Bishop Potter, Rev. Dr. Eccleston, William Lightner, Frank Miller and Rev. Dr. Huntington have already entered their dissent and recommend that the section shall be made to prohibit the marriage of any person who has a divorced husband or wife living. This shall not apply to the innocent party in a divorce suit on his or her filing with the minister a legally certified transcript of the record showing a final decree of court awarding him or her a divorce a vinculo matrimonie on the ground of adultery.

PRINCE WILLIAM NOTES.  
Mr. Thomas B. Alexander died near Minnieville on Monday last of pneumonia.  
The tug D. M. Key, on its way from Occquan with two scows loaded with stone for Fort Sheridan, encountered a heavy storm near High Point on Monday in which one of the scows was sunk.  
The board of directors of the Prince William Horseman's Association met on Saturday last and arranged the prizes for the coming horse show to be held the 30th and 31st of August. The prizes are much larger than last year, and it is believed that the entries will be more than doubled.

Mr. George C. Round's real estate agency sold on Wednesday last the fine estate of the late Major Nokes, the property of his wife and daughter, now residing in San Francisco, to Mr. William R. Free, jr., for \$5,000 cash. It embraces 350 acres, almost entirely encompassing the railroad station and village of Nokesville, including the family mansion and outbuildings, two other dwellings, a blacksmith shop and storehouse at depot.—[Manassas Journal.]


