THE PILOTS' ASSOCIATION AND THE NORFOLK COAL TRADE.
(Special correspondence of the Alexandria Gazette, Washington, July 8, 1898.)

The Gazette's correspondent waited upon Colonel Lamb, of Norfolk, who is now here, a day or two ago and asked him to give the facts concerning the differences between the Pilots' Association of Norfolk and the Potomac and Chesapeake Coal Company. He at first said he preferred not to do so, that he had devoted his friends to the Association, and that at best it was only a family quarrel, and that he did not care to have any outsider know anything about it. However, when pressed, he said he might see the telegrams which were really public property, as they concerned the chartering of vessels to load with Pocahontas coal or the War Department. It seems that for himself, and no agent of the Bureau of Equipment, in order to increase the commerce of Norfolk and extend the sale of Pocahontas coal he had made an arrangement with the Bureau of Equipment to charter their vessels at the lowest possible freight. In attempting to do this he had to report to that bureau the difficulties in his way in order to get freights as low from Norfolk to points of destination as were obtainable in Baltimore in order that the Pocahontas coal could compete with the Cumberland coal at Baltimore, and one of them was that the masters of vessels complained that while coal vessels were free from Baltimore pilotage in going to and from Baltimore, if they went to or from Norfolk, even without calling upon the pilots, they were forced to pay constructive pilotage, or in lieu thereof, a license of 10c per registered ton for navigating their vessels during a year, to prevent federal legislation which might be injurious to the Pilot Association of Virginia. Col. Lamb suggested to the association to waive constructive pilotage; that is, not to charge for service rendered for all vessels chartered to load coal at Lamport's Point and Newport News by the Bureau of Equipment. This was very handsomely acceded to and has enabled a number of vessels to be chartered to load Pocahontas coal that could not otherwise have been obtained. The War Department desiring to have some Pocahontas coal and knowing of the immunity from pilot's license of the Navy Department, requested Colonel Lamb to get the same privilege for vessels chartered to load coal at the Virginia ports by the War Department; and, in pursuance of this, Colonel Lamb telegraphed on June 9, 1898, from New York city, as follows:

"Capt. O. E. Edwards, Pilot Association, Norfolk, Virginia:
"War Department want same exemption from license of vessels chartered by them as navy has. Authorize me to promise it. Direct (answer) to Washington. (Signed) WM LAMB."

And to which he received the following reply:

"Col. Wm. Lamb, Shoreham Hotel, Washington, D. C.:
"My people will not consent to any further concessions in pilotage."
(Signed) O. E. EDWARDS.

To which Col. Lamb immediately replied as follows:

"Dispatch received. Your people are very unparliamentary. Hope decision was not unanimous. Will not charter vessels for army to go to Norfolk."
(Signed) WM. LAMB."

And Colonel Lamb says he has chartered no vessels, and that Lambert's Point has lost business by it; that he was unwilling to discriminate between the army and navy.
