THE MARKET HOUSE, LIBERTY HALL AND MARSHAL HOUSE FIRES.
Repeated inquiries have been made at this office as to the date of the burning of the market house, Liberty Hall, and Marshal House. In its account of the burning of the market house, nearly three columns of the Gazette were used in its edition of Friday, May 19, 1871. We have only space to reproduce a portion of that account: "At half past twelve o'clock last night (May 18, 1871) fire was discovered in the frame building on the corner of Royal street and market alley, occupied by George A. Huntington as a grocery and liquor store. The alarm was instantly sounded and in a short time the entire fire department was on the ground and at work, but despite their efforts the fire spread rapidly and in a short time the entire market house with its steeple and Washington lodge were enveloped in flames and the site upon which they stood soon presented but a mass of charred and blackened walls and timbers. Policemen Hepburn, Walker and Franks passed the building in which the fire originated after 12 o'clock on their rounds and at that time everything was quiet. After they separated the first named officer went to the station house where he stayed a few minutes. On coming down stairs he smelled fire, and on looking up the alley saw smoke issuing from the neighborhood above mentioned. He at once ran in that direction, and ascertaining that the fire was in the store of Mr. Huntington, burst open the door. He looked around for some method of attempting to extinguish the fire but saw none. In a few minutes from the time he entered the entire store was a mass of flames. At 3 o'clock Chief Engineer Holmes, with his carriage, the Columbia and South Washington steam fire engine companies, with the hose carriages and the Metropolitan Hook and Ladder Co. had arrived here on the steamer City of Alexandria, and were hard at work. On account of the scarcity of water one of the Washington steamers was stationed at the wharf at the foot of Cameron street and forced water from the river into the other, stationed at the scene of the fire, by which it was thrown with effect upon the flames. The Washingtonians were hospitably entertained and returned home on the seven o'clock boat this morning. The assistance they rendered was valuable."

From the Gazette Monday, June 24, 1872:
"The old landmarks of the city are slowly but surely disappearing. A year and a month ago the old market house was destroyed, and now it is the reporter's mournful province to chronicle the destruction of the old Alexandria theatre, more recently known as Liberty Hall, around which clung many revered memories. About half-past eleven o'clock last Saturday night, while many persons were yet on the streets, smoke was seen issuing from the burnt building, and the alarm being sounded the fire department was speedily on the ground and at work, &c. The fire, it is supposed, was the work of an incendiary, though there is no clue by which the criminal can be detected. Messrs. Geo. R. Shinn and James P. Coleman, who were among the first to discover the fire, saw a light in the basement of the building. In response to a telegram for assistance steam fire engines No. 4 and No. 2 and the Metropolitan Hook and Ladder Company, of Washington, arrived here on the ferry boat City of Washington, but too late to go into service."

It is generally stated that the Marshall House fire occurred on February 22nd, one falling into the error by reason of the fall of the Hydraulion company, which occurred on the night of the fire, which was Monday, February 24th, 1873. The account of the parade of Saturday, February 22nd, 1873, is published in the Gazette in its edition of Monday, the 24th, and one can judge of its completeness when six compact columns of the Gazette are devoted to describing the events of the day. Of the burning of the Marshall House (a column article) it says:
"One by one the old landmarks of Alexandria are disappearing at the fell touch of the incendiary's torch—the Marshall House—the house made ever memorable by the death of E. I. Swarth, shot by Jackson at the commencement of the civil war for tearing down the Confederate flag that was flying over it, and by the blood of J. K. Dixon, shed while defending his own property. The flames were discovered about twelve o'clock last night by Officers Walker and Christopher Lyles, who were walking down King street at that time, and who instantly sounded the alarm. The fire department was speedily on the ground, the steamer Columbia being a little behind time, in consequence of having been misled by one of the alarm bells which struck the Third ward. The steamer Hydraulion took position at the intersection of King and Pitt streets, and the Columbia at Pitt and Prince streets and soon such an avalanche of water was thrown upon the flames that they were confined to the building in which they

originated and the one adjoining it, and with which communication was effected by numerous doors.
The whole of the back building and the entire interior of the third story of the main building with the roof were destroyed, and the first and second stories badly damaged. The wind was blowing a gale from the northwest at the time, and sparks, cinders and burning shingles were borne to a distance of several blocks, covering the roofs of the buildings that lay in their course, and setting fire to some of them. The excitement caused by fear of a general conflagration was great, and the tops of the houses in the line of the wind were filled with people sweeping off the falling sparks and throwing water on such spots as had caught fire. The cold was intense, and the water froze as fast as it ran off the immediate heat of the fire, &c.
That all three of these fires were incendiary is generally believed and all occurred at about the same hour—midnight. Occurring as they did a quarter of a century ago, the short extract from an extended account of each fire is interesting to the old firemen and instructive to the young.
