HOGS FED ON LIQUOR.—People in Harrodsburg, Ky., have experimented and discovered a method of securing the best pork in the world. Several weeks ago a drove of fifty hogs was turned in on a trough of fermented beer, which is bourbon whiskey in its first stage. The porkers took this new diet greedily, and the entire lot of hogs were absolutely intoxicated for about three weeks until the swell gave out. They would gulp down the beer until they could hold no more, stagger off and then go and repeat the dose. The sight of from thirty to fifty intoxicated hogs, some fighting, some too stupid to fight and some rolling down the hill into the distillery branch, from whence they had been rescued, attracted the attention of many neighbors. When the beer gave out they would neither eat anything else nor be comforted, and it was absolutely pitiful to see and hear them squealing around the troughs. These fat shouts were killed last week and butchered, and their meat unanimously pronounced to be the best flavored, tenderest and most savory pork ever tasted.—(Louisville Commercial.)

AN INDIAN WEDDING.—The daughter of "Big Diver," the Pamunkey chief, was married in Richmond yesterday to Lee Andrew Hawks, of Petersburg. The bride is a comely young full-blooded Indian, and the groom is a half-breed. On account of the tribal law on the Pamunkey reservation, the bride could not marry any but a full blooded man, so they went to Richmond to have the knot tied. The bride's English name was Delilah Almond. She is the chief of a lineage traceable to the grand chiefs of two hundred years ago. Her father is an influential man, and she is present at the marriage. A number of Indian friends went to Richmond from the reservation to attend the wedding. Miss Lucretia Almond, the bride's cousin, and also a full-blooded, was maid of honor.
