CRUELTY TO A CUBAN WIFE.

A large section of Havana is profoundly stirred by the death of the young wife of Senor Villegas, a former Cuban officer, who is alleged to have been cruel to her. Villegas, it is alleged, forced her to take poison and threatened her life with a pistol.

The funeral took place yesterday. Thursday night an immense crowd went past the house, many going in to see the body of the victim in her coffin. Two hundred women called upon Governor General Brooke with a petition asking him to see justice done in the case. In consequence of the Governor-General's indisposition the deputation was received by General Chaffee, who said the affair would be dealt with by the courts, and that Villegas would get what he deserved.

To this the deputation replied that they had no confidence in the Cuban tribunals, and that if justice were not done, they would themselves punish the criminal.

At the grave Senor Arango made an address, in which he said he would himself go to the courts and demand justice. The people cried in response, "We will have justice!" and "Justice shall be done!"

The leaders of the crowd of demonstrators who Thursday night marched on Vivac, the Tombs of Havana, where Villegas is, say they had no intention of lynching him, but only meant to make a peaceful protest and to demand justice from the Governor General.

FIGHTING A RATTLESNAKE.

Charles H. Johnson, paying teller of the New York County National Bank, who lives in Bloomfield, N. J., had a thrilling encounter with a rattlesnake in Lackawanna, Pa., on Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Johnson, with his wife and daughter, is staying at the Delaware House in Lackawanna, and on Wednesday afternoon they went with several young women for a stroll through the woods. They were startled by a peculiar sound coming from some underbrush at the side of the path and saw a huge snake, its eyes glistening and its head darting back and forth in a threatening manner. The women ran, but Mr. Johnson, who had been carrying a stick, stood his ground. Soon the snake glided toward him and coiled to spring. Mr. Johnson then saw that it was a rattler and a big one. Just as the snake struck at Mr. Johnson he struck at the snake. Both missed. Instantly the reptile coiled for a second attack, but before it could strike Mr. Johnson hit it on the head, stunning it. Then he killed it. Although he was not bitten, Mr. Johnson on returning to the hotel took the usual antidote. The skin of the snake was sent to Bloomfield. The reptile measured four feet in length and was as large around as a man's wrist. It had six rattles and a button.

A DAY WITH DREYFUS.

Captain Dreyfus still lives exclusively on milk and eggs. On rising at five o'clock he takes a glass of milk. He is then escorted to the court room under a strong guard. On returning to prison, he takes a second glass of milk, and at one o'clock a soft-boiled egg and another glass of milk.

At two his wife calls upon him, spending a couple of hours with him daily, without restrictions of any kind. After their interview another member of the family sees him for half an hour.

M. Demange arrives daily at half-past four in the afternoon, and remains until seven, discussing the progress of the case. During the remainder of the time the accused generally reads or studies mathematics. He retires to bed about half-past nine. Dreyfus retains his good spirits, and expresses confidence that he will be acquitted, especially now that he believes M. Labori will be able to return to the active work of the defense.

TROUBLE IN PARIS.

The French government, which had two thousand police, infantry and cavalry surrounding the building in Rue de Chabrol, where Guerin, the anti Semite leader, had fortified himself, and defied the French government to arrest him, has, as stated yesterday, decided to leave him to his own devices. This decision, in face of Guerin openly flaunting the time of Guerin openly flaunting the government war, is regarded as a bad augury of an inevitable crisis after the Rennes court-martial has concluded its work.

There have been some desperate street fights in the neighborhood of Rue de Chabrol, the combatants on one side shouting "Down with the Jews!" while the other side replied with shouts, "Long live the Republic," and "Down with the priests." Later in the evening the disturbances in the streets became worse, and there were numerous fights with the police. Many of the latter were injured. Twenty arrests were made.


