### GERMANY'S GREAT GAMBLING SCANDAL

The sensational trial of the Club der Harmlosen has stirred fashionable and sporting circles to the very depths. A peculiar feature of the case is that some of the witnesses belong to the immediate entourage of Emperor William. Moreover, officers of garrisons all over the empire, and men who belong to the Guard regiments, are implicated, as well as experts on the correct way of playing baccarat, and men of the highest fashion, like Count von Reventlow, of the Union Club. There was considerable difficulty in getting the experts to appear. One of the most notorious gambling houses in Berlin, when asked to furnish experts, replied this was impossible, as its members were not allowed to gamble. Many important witnesses were absent.

Some excused themselves on the ground that they had gone bear hunting for Africa for a year or had a sudden illness. Others, like Lieutenant von Sobradier, committed suicide, or, like Count von Stosch and Baron von Neimpts, fled to this country. Two members of the club, Count Egloffstein and Count von Kussow, are accused of defalcation. Wolf, the founder of the club, has gone to parts unknown. It was proved that he had been convicted of theft and had served a term of imprisonment, although most of the witnesses asserted he was a man of excellent demeanor and perfect manners, whence his nickname, "Gentleman Wolf." Count Flattan, although his evidence would have been of the most important character, was excused from testifying. General von Kriebler, father of one of the defendants, the commander of an army corps and an intimate adviser of Emperor William, refused to appear. His son admitted that he had been guilty of fleeing.

In well-informed army circles it is asserted that Emperor William not only wants the matter thoroughly sifted, but intends that the trial shall be followed by an extensive weeding out of gamblers and otherwise undesirable officers. It is asserted that there are 1,000 of this stripe quartered in sixteen garrisons who will come within the category of offenders.

"NO RACE" COST A MILLION.—It has cost spectators who wanted to see an international yacht race nearly \$2,000,000, and they have received very little for their money. There were about 400 craft out to see the races. Of these 300 carried excursionists, who paid anywhere from \$2 to \$10 for their tickets. The average number of passengers on each steamer was about 500, that the total was about 150,000 each day. The average price of tickets was \$5 each, so that \$750,000 was paid for the passage alone each day. Certainly each passenger paid \$1 for food and drink. This brings the amount up to \$900,000, and certainly the incidental expenses increased the total to nearly \$1,000,000 for each day.

This, of course, does not take in what was spent on the yachts, numbering in all about 100. The additional cost to the owners of these crafts comes in the entertaining. Commodore Morgan had about 100 guests on the Corsair. Sir Thomas Lipton had 150 on the Erin, Howard Gould had 85 many on the Niagara, and so it went.  
The yacht owners spent probably \$25,000 a day in entertainment. From all of which it may be seen that an international yacht race flake costs a lot of money.

AN OPAR CAPTURED.—A magnificent specimen of the rare British fish, the opah, has been captured in the North Sea. The specimen in question was purchased by Mr. Scootey, fishmonger, of Southend, Eng., as a snuffish, and identified by Mr. Charles Huxsey. Its prevailing colors are splendid red and green, with tints of purple and gold dotted over with round silver white spots. The fins are a brilliant vermilion, and the iris of the eye a vivid s. arlet, a curious ride runs in irregular curves from the tail to the gill cover. The fish—the dimensions of which are: Length, 3 feet 7 1/2 inches; width, 2 feet 9 1/2 inches; girth, 4 feet 6 inches, and weight, 88 pounds—is being set up in London, and will probably find its way in due course to the Buckland Museum.


