**WILD CAT INSURANCE COMPANIES.**  
To the Editor of the Alexandria Gazette.  
On reading over, last night the Sequel-Centennial Business Directory and Official Programme, I found I was pursuing a publicist on admirable as respects typography and general matter, and which so far as my vision went gave credit where credit was due, except in one notable and singular instance, viz: On page 6, whereon is exploited the Business Men's League, the following paragraph appears:

"The League then took up the subject of bogus insurance companies, which purported to have location at Alexandria, and secured their extinction."  
Now there is not a single thread of accuracy in either the wrap or the wool of that paragraph, and in the interests of truth I cannot permit its statements to go unchallenged. The Business Men's League had no more to do with stamping out these wild cat insurance companies than it had with the destruction of Cervera's fleet of Santiago. The fact is that I, alone, conceived, formulated and carried to a successful conclusion the plan whereby these fraudulent concerns were driven out of Alexandria, and all the league did was to throw a bouquet to me after I had practically accomplished it; though it would now appear that the bouquet had a string to it, as in this directory they have pinned its flowers onto themselves.

The history of the matter is briefly this: On the 8th day of January 1896 I introduced in the Senate eleven bills to repeal the charters respectively of the National City, Potomac Fire, Potomac Fire & Marine, Mechanics' Fire, National Home, United, Phoenix, Old Dominion, Planters, and Monarch insurance companies and got a man, woman or child in Alexandria in view of my intention so to do, or that it had been done until the newspapers announced the fact. I neither consulted with the Business Men's League nor any one else, and advised with no one and received no suggestions from any source whatever on the subject. Indeed I was particularly careful not to admit anybody into my confidence, because I wanted to take the reins by surprise and for full annoyance and a possible lobby. I put the bills through the Senate as rapidly as possible, and then went over to the House of Delegates and pushed them all, except one, to passage there, unaided, because no aid was needed. They were shortly followed by a swarm of bills from all over the State, copied in "olden verbi" (except as to names and places) from mine, wiping out all the bogus insurance companies in Virginia, with one exception, and that exception was a company located in Alexandria which succeeded in holding up in the House of Delegates the Senate bill repealing its charter, until that one I afterwards put in the hands of a receiver, where it now lies.

I believe it was Tallyrand who gave the advice "never write a letter and never burn one," and I have followed the latter clause of his injunction all through my career. Before me lies a letter dated January 10, 1896, addressed to me and signed by the gentleman who was then and still is the president of the Business Men's League, in which this language occurs: "We read with pleasure the bill introduced by you in the Senate for the repeal of the charters of all wildcat insurance companies, and do not hesitate to say that you are entitled to the thanks of the community for your efforts in that line."

I also see in front of me a letter from the same gentleman dated January 22, 1896, transmitting several resolutions of the said League, the germane one whereof reads as follows: "Resolved that the thanks of this League be tendered to Senator Murrback for his action in securing the repeal of the charters of certain insurance corporations purporting to be located in Alexandria, and that our delegate be requested to have the House concur in the repeal of the above charters."

These bills had already, on January 17, 1896, passed the Senate, and had on January 18, 1896, referred to the appropriate committee in the House. They passed the House on January 27 and were signed by the Governor on January 30, 1896, never having been in any danger of defeat from the moment of their inception and whilst I had charge of them.

So much for the claim that "the League took up the subject of bogus insurance companies at Alexandria and secured their extinction."
