

BULLS FOUGHT AMID FLAMES.

A bull fight with a fatal ending was a thrilling incident of the fire that destroyed the barn and stable of Leader J. McCormick at Lake Forest on Monday morning, says the Chicago Tribune.

The charred carcasses of the two bulls were found Thursday in the ruins. The animals had died in the tangle of a death struggle. They were fighting in the basement of the stable, and stopped only when the structure fell in on them.

The bulls were two that Mr. McCormick had imported recently from Switzerland, and were of the variety known as Brown Swisses. One was docile, but the other was a savage beast that had caused the hands of the farm to jump fences and take to the trees more than once. The animals were chained in stalls in the basement of the barn when the fire was discovered.

Great effort was being made by the workmen about the premises to save the valuable stock in the stables. William Anderson, head farmer, went into the basement to rescue the two fine bulls. He got the gentle one loose and led it out of the stall and then unchained the belligerent one. The latter rushed out and came face to face with the other.

Both animals lowered their heads and bellowed till they could be heard above the roar of the fire, standing on guard and waiting for a chance to charge. Anderson made his escape without daring to interfere.

Soon the upper part of the stable was wrapped in flames. The men stood watching the two bulls in the basement. The light of the fire shone through the holes in the floor and lighted the arena in which the strange bull fight was taking place.

The animals came together with a crash and reeled back from the shock. Again and again they charged. As if they realized that it was a fight to the death, they struggled with such fury that both of them went to their knees, yet neither had any advantage that could be seen.

The floor above the battling bulls was all ablaze and the spectators could see the skin on the backs of the fighters smoke and crackle with the heat, but the battle only went on the more furiously. Some of the farm hands with long poles tried to separate the maddened beasts, but as they prodded them the fury of the fight increased.

The superstructure of the stable was tottering and still the battle raged. The bulls were locked in a death struggle when the building crashed in on them and buried them in the fiery ruin.

Mr. McCormick said he had seen bull fights in Spain and in Mexico but he had never witnessed such a thrilling contest as that.

POOR HUNTING.—Hunting this year in the lower counties of the Northern Neck is not as good as years past and it is supposed that the cold weather of last February killed out the greater portion of the game. It is now almost impossible to get more than seven or eight partridges on an all day's hunt, whereas last year it was nothing unusual to bag from 25 or 30 in the same time. There are quite a number of rabbits about eight miles from the river shore, but even these are not as numerous as last year, and wild turkeys are almost a thing of the past in Lancaster and Northumberland counties. The wild duck has made its appearance in the Rappahannock, but as yet has not been shot to any considerable extent. The wild goose is conspicuous by his absence, as the flocks which usually pass over that country have not yet been seen, presumably on account of the Indian summer.
