LOCAL BREVITIES.

Nine lodgers were at the station house last night. A marriage license was issued in Washington yesterday to John Jackson and Eveline Corbin, both of Prince William county, Va.

Mr. S. H. Lunt, auctioneer, will at 12 o'clock tomorrow sell the lot of ground with the improvements on the north side of Wilkes street near Columbus, for the trustees, Messrs. Thomas J. Fannon and Anthony W. Armstrong.

Promotions have been made in the Treasury department in Washington, of the following: Virginia: Loul, of Payne, \$690 to \$720; Miss Virginia E. Campbell, \$690 to \$720; Miss Ellen C. Fitzgibbon, \$1,200 to \$1,400; Harris E. Dodge, a \$900 clerk, has been transferred to the office of Internal Revenue from the sixth internal revenue District of Virginia.

The Legislature at its last session passed a bill making important amendments to the law for the protection of bottles that bear trade marks. Owners are required to file the trade marks with the Secretary of the Commonwealth before the first day of May. This is designed to protect the owners of bottles and to punish persons who are found to be illegally in possession of the same.

Freeman R. Green, 35 years old, formerly of Fort Wayne, Ind., who had been employed as a \$1,400 clerk in the miscellaneous division of the Coast and Geodetic Survey for twelve years, committed suicide shortly after 6 o'clock last evening by shooting himself through the right temple at his home in Brightwood, Washington.
