Haeckley Hall, the building which was burned recently at the Manassas Industrial School, is to be re-built of brick. Plans for the same have been prepared by Mr. Wm. L. Clark, architect, of this city. Contractors interested will do well to read the advertisement in another column.

Election excitement seems to be on the increase. Talk of next spring's election is being introduced. It is understood that Mayor Simpson will again be a candidate for re-election next year, rumors to the contrary notwithstanding.

The School Board for Jefferson district, Alexandria county, will ask for bids for plans and specifications for the new school house which is to be erected in Del Ray.

The remains of George Stevens, who was killed by the fall of a clay bank in Washington on Tuesday, were brought here for interment in the national cemetery.

Feme colored men who were in the government service during the civil war will ask Congress to pay them the money withheld from them at that time.

In the Corporation Court today Rev. J. A. Jeffers of Trinity M. E. Church was granted leave to perform the rites of matrimony.

Mr. E. Lee Field has received a very large and fine stock of clothing and gentlemen's furnishing goods for the spring trade.

The arrival of spring is still delayed, and last night the temperature was so cold that ice formed in exposed places.

A new case of small pox has been discovered in Washington, the victim being a four-year-old colored child.

The congregation of the Second Presbyterian Church last night elected Messrs. G. B. Kennedy and Wm. E. Latham trustees.

At a meeting of James W. Jackson Council, Jr. O. U. A. M., last night three members were initiated.

So far the Police Commissioners have not been called to consider Officer Spinks's case.

The northwest wind of last night and today has caused low tides in the river.

A colored man was badly beaten by a bartender at Jackson City last night.

The water mains were flushed today.

THE WAR IN AFRICA. A decided change has come over the war situation in south Africa. The Boers have forced Lord Roberts to take the defensive and they are actively threatening Bloemfontein.

The British commander-in-chief is concentrating his troops around the Free State capital. He has mounted naval guns on the approaches to the city. It is believed in London that the Boers are seeking to carry out President Kruger's threat to retake Bloemfontein.

A force of 6,000 burghers is approaching Bloemfontein from the north. Another body threatens to cut off Lord Roberts's communications at Springfontein to the south. Should they do this he would be completely isolated.

The divisions of Generals French and C. Ville, which have been operating east of Bloemfontein trying to retake the seven captured guns, seem to have given up the effort. They have returned to the city.

CONVENTION HALL BURNED.

As stated in yesterday's Gazette, Convention Hall, the pride of Kansas City, the auditorium in which the democratic national convention was to have been held, was burned to the ground yesterday. The cause of the fire is unknown. It started near the engine room, in the northeast corner of the building, about 1 o'clock and in less than half an hour the building was in ruins. The flames swept across Central street and caught in the roof of Lathrop School, which cost about \$35,000. While the flames were still at work a subscription was started to rebuild the hall. Over \$25,000 has already been secured and a meeting was held last night at the Commercial Club to arrange for a mass-meeting tonight at which the rest of the \$100,000 it is estimated will be necessary will be raised. The insurance on the hall amounts to \$155,000.
