**A REMINISCENCE.**

A writer in a Washington paper says: My earliest recollections of a confectionary establishment are of Paul Kinch's, at Alexandria. His ice cream, served in tall glasses, and his cakes were unrivaled. He kept in the rear of the confectionery store a bar supplied with the best liquors, and his customers were of the most respectable class, quiet, staid old citizens, who went there assured they would get the very best. One of the legends of that time, connected as it was with Kinch's tavern and the Virginia House, kept by a widow, who subsequently married Harry Sweeting, was told me as a remarkably-planned attempt to murder Mr. Corse, of Alexandria. The father of Gen. Montgomery Corse was wounded by a man who lay in ambush on a dark, rainy night, and after the shooting the man revealed himself to Mr. Corse, who recovered, and swore he had been shot by Henry Pittman, with whom he had had some business difficulty. The excitement was intense, for at the time, 1823, the city was a very small place and both men were well known. Mr. Corse was a prominent citizen of Alexandria, and Henry Pittman, who had failed in business, was at the time in the editorial department of the United States Telegraph. Duil Green's paper, Pittman was arrested, gave bail, and obtained a change of venue and was tried in Washington. On the trial Mrs. Sweeting swore that Mr. Pittman took his lunch every night at her house, and did so on this night at about the usual hour, between 7 and 8 o'clock, and a well known citizen swore he had drunk a glass of beer with Pittman at a quarter to eight o'clock at Kinch's bar and had a conversation over their glasses. The alibi was so conclusive in convincing the jury that it was impossible for Pittman to have been in Alexandria at a little past 9 o'clock that night that he was acquitted. Mr. Swan, the District attorney, argued in vain that Mrs. Sweeting must have been mistaken, but the other witness confirmed her statement by saying when he returned to his store he looked at the clock and saw it was either 7:45 or 8:15 o'clock and ordered his assistants to shut up the store. Mr. Corse told, with the most perfect assurance, now Pittman, after shooting him, had come out in the light of the oil lamp, with which the streets were lighted, that Corse might see who had shot him. It was discovered afterward that Pittman had a carriage waiting for him in front of Corse's saloon, Elever to street, Washington, and timed it so he could reach Alexandria at the hour he knew, from long acquaintance, Mr. Corse would pass the spot where he was in waiting.

Pittman took desperate chances, for at that time the old draw at the Long bridge was moved by hand in the most primitive style and required at least a half hour.

**GRANDMOTHER A BRIDE.**—At a double wedding at Manassas, Pa., Thursday, a grandmother and granddaughter were the brides. Mrs. Mary C. Farnsworth, of Bloomsbury, married F. W. Geary, of Altoona; her granddaughter, Miss Pauline Smith, married Hiram Shuman, of Philadelphia. It was expected that the wedding would be a triple one, and that Mrs. Farnsworth's son would also be married, but a business engagement detained him.

**CHapel Point.**—The future of Chapel Point is yet undetermined. A portion of the would-be county seat is being plowed up to be put in crops and the buildings, so says the manager of the Jesuit priests, will be let for summer resort purposes. Two applicants, it is said, have made a bid for the latter. It is feared it will be a place of entertainment for the county folks again during this summer.—[Maryland Independent.]
