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FAIRFAX NOTES.

A meeting of the reunion committee of Confederate Veterans was held at Fairfax, May 28. It was resolved that the date for the proposed celebration be changed to September 11 and 12.

Mr. John Randolph Henry and Mrs. Lee Lacy, of Lynchburg, were married in Washington on Tuesday and came to Fairfax, where they were the guests until Wednesday morning of Mrs. Thos. Moore.

Two Mormon elders, C. N. Ivie, of Aurora, Utah, and Samuel Spencer, of Escalante, same State, were in Fairfax on Saturday. They have been doing missionary work in this county since January, but in such a quiet way that they are rarely heard of.

At the election on Thursday, the 24th ult., the following gentlemen were elected members of the Fairfax Town Council for the ensuing term of four years: Joseph E. Willard, Frank R. Ford, E. B. Holbrook, Robert Wiley, George W. Gaines, William J. Canfield and James W. Taylor.

The Board of Supervisors met here on Monday last. The county levy for 1900 was fixed at 25c, on \$100 of real and personal property, &c., county school, 10c; district school, 10c; road tax, 20c, and 50c, on each tithe and 50c, on each dog. A contract for the building of a bridge over Luckey branch was granted to C. H. Kruse for \$239.—[Herald.]

Mr. James P. Machen, jr., of Fairfax, and Miss Georgia Frances Golden were married in Washington on Monday at the home of the bride. They left at once for a tour in the North and will return to Fairfax tomorrow. Mrs. Machen is a niece of Mrs. Geo. A. Gordon, of Fairfax, where she has visited frequently, and like the fortunate groom, has many friends here who wish them a long and happy life.

INTERESTING TO ARCHAEOLOGISTS.

The New York Independent has received from Prof. Rufus B. Richardson, director of the American School of Archaeology, Athens, under date of May 29, the following cable message:

"The American School of Archaeology at Athens has just made an important discovery at Corinth, the excavation of which site has been assigned to the American school. In excavating the Agora, at a depth of twenty feet, an ancient Greek fountain has been found, with bronze lion-head spouts in their original position. Besides this unique discovery much valuable sculpture has been found, and enough of the great Propylaea has been laid open to make it possible to restore the typography of Corinth. The Greek government finds these discoveries so important that it will build a special museum for preserving the monuments that have been recovered."
