The Chinese situation. Shanghai, June 13.—The complete isolation of Peking continues. Tung Fu Siang, the Emperor's most trusted adviser, has promised to make an effort to exterminate the foreigners. It was the soldiers of Tung Fu Siang who are reported to have murdered the Chancellor of the Japanese Legation in Peking.

It is reported that the powers have agreed to forgive the Emperor and her Manchurian advisers on their promise to amend their conduct. This report is regarded as almost incredible here.

Paris, June 13.—A telegram from Peking says that the Dowager Empress has directed the Tsung-Li-Yamec to inform the legations that the government will not oppose the entry of foreign troops into Peking.

London, June 13.—The correspondent of the Publishers' Press learns positively that Ambassador Choate has opened negotiations with Lord Salisbury relative to the situation in China. It is believed the object of the negotiations is to secure a joint understanding in case of eventualities in the far East.

Ohio Democrats.

Columbus, O., June 13.—The democratic State convention was called to order by State chairman W. S. Thomas this morning. The platform reaffirms of the Chicago platform; protests against the President and Congress controlling new territory independent of the constitution; denunciation against imperialism as leading to militarism; denunciation of trusts; denouncing the currency law of the last Congress; demand for removal of tariff from all monopolized commodities; expression of sympathy for the Boers; call for an honorable cessation of war in the Philippines; adherence to the Monroe doctrine; construction and control of Nicaraguan canal by the United States; condemnation of administration of pension department; immediate reduction of war taxes; favors the election of President and Vice President and Senators by direct vote of the people; deplors the Cuban postal scandals; denounces the Porto Rican law; and demands the nomination of Bryan and instructs the Ohio delegates to vote for him.
