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RUHLIN KNOCKED OUT

In a fight that for punishment, slugging, and blood exceeded anything ever seen in the East since the Horton law went into effect, Robert Fitzsimmons, champion middleweight pugilist of the world, and also the man who is justly entitled now to fight with Jeffries, the present heavyweight champion, literally beat Gus Ruhlin, of Akron, Ohio, into a state of unconsciousness in the 8th round, at the Madison Square Garden, in New York, last night.

Ruhlin, because of his signal victory over Sharkey last June, was considered a coming man in the heavyweight class. It has been said of him that, coached by Corbett and Madden, he had developed into a pugilist capable of winning the laurels from Jeffries, to say nothing of defeating the veteran Fitzsimmons, who was knocked out by Jeffries about a year ago. It was also said of Ruhlin that he would show in last night's fight improved form, increased speed, and wonderful ability in every respect.

Therefore a crowd of 15,000 spectators, who packed the great arena to see the mill, expected to see an exhibition of the manly art by Ruhlin that would be far above the average. Ruhlin had the public support as far as the betting went, though there was so much Fitzsimmons money floating about that no odds either way existed when it became time for the men to put up their hands. But before the mill had been under way two rounds it was demonstrated beyond the question of a doubt that Fitzsimmons was by no means played out, and was there to put up a fight far better than anything he has shown since he whipped Corbett at Carson City.

In the second round Fitzsimmons showed what a terrible puncher he is by landing a hook straight upon the jaw, and then whipped it fairly into the pit of the stomach. The latter blow landed Ruhlin up like a jackknife, and was really powerful enough to take all his steam away. Ruhlin went down hard and took the full count. He was in such distress that when he went to his corner it did not seem possible for him to continue, but his seconds fixed him up, and his remarkable physique brought him about so that in the third round he was pretty well recovered. Still, Fitzsimmons had the better of it from that time to the end, and whenever he landed a punch upon a vital spot he had the big Ohio fighter staggering all over the ring.

Ruhlin began the battle just as he did with Sharkey. He did not rush, but gradually forced matters, attempting to jolt Fitzsimmons' head with straight lefts. Fitzsimmons, however, was on to this style and with constant punching in the body. During the first round Ruhlin, with these left-hand blows, shook Fitzsimmons considerably, but he did not have enough power in them to put the Corishman down. Right there Fitzsimmons discovered that Ruhlin was not such a great puncher as he had been led to believe, and that he could take chances with him where could not with a man like Jeffries.

No after that Fitzsimmons, no matter how hard Ruhlin tried to hit him, never broke ground, and took many of Gus' punches in the face just to show how weak they were. There was one period in the fight where Fitzsimmons held his face out in the fourth round, and though Ruhlin had the mark in front of him, and hit it half a dozen times, he could not even stagger Fitzsimmons with any of his blows.

Corbett gave constant and frantic aid from outside of the ring, and upon one occasion he had to be suppressed by the police. In fact, it seemed to be a case of rat as all around in the Ruhlin camp. When the last round came Fitzsimmons simply slugged Ruhlin until the big man did not know what was going on. Ruhlin did not have strength enough to hold up his hands, and was blind from the blood that flowed from his eyes, nose, and mouth.

The knockout was one of the cleanest ever administered, and was the result of a terrific left-hand hook straight upon the point of the jaw. Prior to this blow Ruhlin was knocked down with a storm of blows. Ruhlin's defeat, while a surprise, was so clean-cut that there can be nothing but praise for Fitzsimmons. Bob was never anxious to retreat. In fact, he forced the fighting from start to finish.

Fitzsimmons' victory puts him up next to Jeffries, and as the champion has expressed a willingness to fight any one before September 1 perhaps a match may be arranged, but Fitzsimmons in the meantime has a battle on with Sharkey, which, in view of the result of last night's encounter, looks like a little easy money for the Australian. Fitzsimmons showed that he has lost none of his hitting powers and that while he is an old man today, so to speak, he is young in point of physical strength and condition.

He stripped in magnificent shape, never looking better in his life. Yet when compared to Ruhlin, in point of build and general make-up, Bob appeared to be so greatly over-matched that he had no chance.

Ruhlin was taken by his dressing-room and was in very bad shape. He

almost immediately became unconscious. A doctor in the building responded to a hurry call and found the case so serious that he administered strychnine. The bags were also applied to his head and he partially revived. He was then removed with the assistance of W. Madden and Charley Goff to a cab, and taken to Edwards' bath.

He again collapsed on his arrival there, and as all local means failed to restore him to consciousness, Dr. Guy D. Lombard, of 6 east Thirty-second street, was hastily summoned.

The doctor arrived at 12:15 o'clock and after making a thorough examination of Ruhlin said he felt quite safe in saying that the fighter had sustained no internal injuries. He added that the blow which Ruhlin received when his head struck the stage at the time of the knockout, together with the plexus blow and other severe body punishment, had brought him to a state of collapse and that no serious results would be likely to occur, judging from his present condition.

While the physician was examining him Ruhlin opened his eyes and faintly asked for water. This was given him and he again lapsed into a sort of stupor. Blood at this time was trickling from his ears and nose. Dr. Lombard said that as a matter of precaution he would remain for a while.

The gross receipts of the fight amounted to about \$88,000 of which 50 per cent, or \$19,000 went to the fighters. Fitz will receive 75 per cent of this or \$14,250; while Ruhlin will get 25 per cent, or \$4,750.
