CASTELLANE NOT SOLD OUT.

The forced auction sale of Count Boni de Castellane's chateau, Du Marais, with the furniture, carriages and horses, which was announced by posters and advertisements in all the papers published in neighboring towns, failed to take place, Boni having succeeded at the last minute in raising sufficient money to appease his creditors for a time.

On the day of the announced auction a characteristic scene occurred. At the ten there descended a burly fellow, who ordered loudly a carriage to be driven to Castellane's country seat. Being in a furious mood, the man took every-thing present in his confidence. He said he was a Paris contractor, who had last year effected important alterations in the Chateau Du Marais. He had been unable so far to obtain any money whatsoever of the large sums due him. He had just learned that the count had disinterested several creditors in order to escape the sale and was now going to get some money himself or break Boni's bones.

Two hours later he returned triumphantly waving a considerable check upon a Paris bank. He said he had at first been denied admittance, but forced his way, despite the flunkeys, finding the Count and Countess Boni de Castellane amid more than 20 aristocratic guests assembled for the opening of the shooting season.

At first Boni attempted to dismiss his creditor loudly, but a awful row ensued, and the contractor being enraged, muscular and furious, finally got a check which constituted a decent instalment upon the total sum due.

POPE EXPECTING DEATH.

The remarkable admission that he considers the end of his long career at hand has been made by Pope Leo XIII. The Pope has always been noted for his interest in the popular superstitions of the people of Rome. One of them is that the death or disaster to the kings of Piedmont portend similar happenings to the popes of Rome.

Policy players have been playing heavily at the government lottery, making large sums on the numbers that correspond to King, Pope and Death. It was hardly expected that Leo XIII himself would allude to the subject, but this he has done.

The occasion was the reception for members of the noble guard. Among those present was the nephew of Cardinal Rampolla, Marquis Perara, a young man who rejoices in friendly intercourse with the Pope.

"Your Holiness," he said, will, we trust and pray, be spared to us for many recurrences of your onomastic feast."

"Lucky if I see one of these recurrences," but there is no likelihood of it," replied the Pope. "You know the strange fact of coincident disaster that the populace of Rome allude to in their popular superstitions. Humbler is gone and my turn ought to be near."

Another evidence of forecast in Rome is the renewed and exceedingly animated discussion regarding the personality of the next Pope.

The reconciliation party has a new and powerful candidate in the person of Cardinal Sarto, Patriarch of Venice, who is marked by his extreme independence and his prudence in not meddling with outside politics.

CO-EDUCATION NOT A SUCCESS.

The question of separation of sexes is under discussion by the faculty of Chicago University. It appears that the co-education of men and women is not as successful as its promoters have asserted. Much of the time is lost in flirtation. A few lines of topics for consideration in the congregation which is the most representative body at the University, and whose advisory action is usually followed, was announced a few months ago, and among it was this:

"Resolved, That better educational results would be secured at the University by teaching the sexes in separate classes."

"This question is to be discussed seriously among the faculty," said Miss Elizabeth Wallace, head of Beecher Hall and acting dean of women.

"It has been talked of for some time, but I cannot give the reasons," Professor George S. Goodspeed, recorder and a member of the committee, said. "The question is in the air, and the committee considered it of importance and worthy of consideration in the congregation."
