The steam callope of the Wallace Green Company, while on the parade yesterday, broke down in front of the City Hall and was repaired by Messrs. John A. Cogan & Bros.

There was but one case for trial at the Police Court this morning, that of George King, colored, charged with assault and beating Martha Chittigton, also colored. He was fined \$10.

Marriage licenses were issued in Washington yesterday to John Sison and Bertha Campbell, both of Alexandria, and to Cardwell R. Coleman, of Spottsylvania county, and Sallie W. Davis, of Caroline county.

It is reported that another glass factory will be in operation in this city in the near future. The Virginia Glass Works Company now employs about 100 men, and it is said that the new concern will employ about fifty men at the start and will increase their force as necessary demands.

The large locust tree which for years past has stood in front of the residence of Mr. P. J. Dempsey, on Fairfax street, between Prince and Duke, was cut down today, the tree having become dangerous from old age, and the neighbors being afraid it would fall and do some damage.
