HE TRIED TO KILL THE WHOLE FAMILY.
William Seaton, aged 22 years, formerly of Decatur, Ill., yesterday attempted to exterminate an entire family, his relatives, at South Park, nine miles from Seattle. With an axe he smashed in the heads of four people, leaving them for dead, then shot one man in the back and attempted to kill a deputy sheriff. Before finally being captured Seaton was shot twice, but not fatally, by Deputy Sheriff Kelly.

The only one killed outright was Seaton's uncle, Daniel Richards. Seaton broke in the head of his sister, Mrs. Roy Clark, but her recovery is hoped for. The other two victims were Myrtle and Hazel Haggood, aged about ten years, children of a former husband of Mrs. Clark. The skulls of the little ones were crushed and their bodies were thrown into a manger in the barn. It was supposed they were dead but a late report from the county hospital says that the skull of one of the children had been raised and there is hope of recovery. The other child will undoubtedly die.

A man named Kennedy, who got in Seaton's way after the tragedy, was shot in the back but not seriously. Seaton fired three times at Kelley before Kelly brought him down with two shots, which took effect in the head and arm. Under the belief that all his intended victims were actually dead, Seaton told the following story:

"I was disgusted with the actions of my sister, and after I had struck her in the head with an axe, I came to the conclusion I might as well make a clean sweep. I smashed the skulls of the children and then threw their bodies into the manger. Returning to the house I saw my uncle asleep on the sofa. I chopped his head almost off."

While telling his story Seaton gave no evidence of insanity. In fact, he made the specific statement that he was not insane.

A BACHELOR'S ADVICE.
"Don't do as all the girls do," said a bachelor a few days ago, when it was claimed by his young niece that "all the girls" drank now:

"Take that, my young relative," he said, "and pin it up over your mirror. It isn't a great quotation from one of your poets, but it is a piece of life wisdom from a man who knows what other men think and what the best and the worst women do."

"If you are a well-headed, don't do as 'all the girls' do and drink whisky cocktails before meals and King William and club soda at lunch in hotel cafes. A glass of Madeira at your mother's dinner table is not wise until you are 25, and even then it is just as well you refuse."

"A woman wants to make herself attractive to men, and some one man in particular; that's what you are all up to, isn't it? Well, take my word for it that whisky and cigarettes are to be carefully avoided as a soiled collar, wrinkles and uncombed hair. If a man finds out there is really something strong and fine beneath the surface of a girl who drinks or smokes, rest assured the first thing he will do is to get her to stop it."

"Be level-headed, my young relative, and know that things that are the fashion in certain sets are not always the things to adopt. I think you are right about it being the fashion; in all my life I've never seen so much of it done by young and middle-aged women in public in Philadelphia and Atlantic City as for the past two years, but be as exclusive about your habits as you are of your friends." LYNCHING IN WYTHE COUNTY.
In the lower part of Wythe county Thursday afternoon a young white woman, Mrs. Robert Fisher, was criminally assaulted by a negro man named Daniel Long, aged 23 years. The outrage was committed after the victim had been choked into insensibility and the negro escaped. The whole countryside was soon aroused and Thursday night Long was arrested by officers at his home in Ivanhoe, a mining town three miles from the scene of the outrage. Another negro named Lewis Hall, who was with him, was also arrested. The two were taken before Mrs. Fisher, who immediately identified Long. The officers started with him for jail, but an undisguised crowd of about one hundred men took Long from the jail, and after allowing him time to pray, attempted to hang him to a limb of a tree. The rope broke twice, and then the negro was broke to a tree and shot to death. Long implicated Hall, declaring that Hall was watching for him, and the latter also would have been lynched but for an earnest pleading of Thomas Blair, a prominent farmer. A compromise verdict was reached in the case of Hall, the crowd tearing his clothes from his body and whipping him unmercifully.
