GREAT FORTUNES OF THE CENTURY.

Among the wonderful things of the century about closing are the great fortunes accumulated within a comparatively few years. Andrew Carnegie and John D. Rockefeller are the prime of men yet, and yet each of them has a fortune of stupendous proportions. It is popularly believed that Mr. Carnegie's fortune is as much as \$150,000,000 and that Mr. Rockefeller's is more than \$250,000,000. And the fortune of each is growing at a wonderful rate. Mr. Carnegie landed in this country from Scotland when still a youth with only a few dollars in his pocket. He borrowed \$50 from an uncle with which to reach New York. He had talent, industry and a great force of character, and his advancement was rapid. He laid the foundation of the great steel plant which bears his name, and which now yields a revenue of \$40,000,000 a year, with only \$1,250.

Mr. Rockefeller began as a book-keeper. Being a far-sighted man he early became one of the chief factors in the Standard Oil Company. He managed wisely and invested with judgment. New York has a great deal more wealth than he knows what to do with. He has too much to be happy. He is an object of envy of thousands of people, and no doubt he is importuned constantly by many who are less fortunate for a share of his wealth. His daughter said recently in an interview that he was not happy. Riches do not bring happiness.

There are hundreds of great fortunes which have been made in the last half century. Those of Mr. Carnegie and Mr. Rockefeller are especially mentioned because they are the largest. Will be coming century witness the accumulation of such vast fortunes as have been accumulated in the latter half of this? For the good of the country it is to be hoped not. [Savannah News.]

BUSINESS FAILURES.—Dun's review today says:

"While it is not yet possible to print accurate figures of failures during the full year 1900, a preliminary statement may be made that will approximate the final result. Detailed returns for all but the last few days of the year have been compiled, and adding a proportionate amount for the time still to elapse, it appears that commercial failures will number about 10,630, with liabilities of \$137,000,000.

"Of this number 2,300 were in manufacturing, for \$49,750,000, while there were 7,300 in trading for \$80,000,000, and 531 brokers, transporters, etc., not properly belonging in either of the other classes, for \$27,250,000. Besides these strictly commercial defaults there were 60 personal concerns, with liabilities of \$24,000,000, swelling the total to 10,630 in number, and \$170,000,000 in amount. This shows a large increase over the preceding year, when all failures numbered 9,393, and liabilities were \$123,132,679.

DRIVE THE TEACHER INTO A POND. Wesley Dugan, a public school teacher near Petersburg, Ind., was the victim of a hazing at the hands of his pupils on Wednesday which came near costing him his life. He was set upon by the larger pupils in his school and carried to the edge of a pond in which it was proposed to duck him. Breaking away he ran into the water and waded to a stump some distance from the bank. There he was pelted with stones and clubs till forced to take to the water again and try to reach the opposite bank. He was already numbed with the cold and before reaching the opposite bank lost consciousness and would have drowned had not a farmer rescued him.

WIFE DESERTS UNTIDY HUSBAND.—Charles Drake, of Winsted, Conn., aged 50 years, proposed Saturday, December 8, to Mrs. Anna Root, a widow 48 years old, and the couple were married that night at the home of Charles Root, a nephew of Mrs. Root's first husband. Drake on the day of his wedding bought the farm of Oscar Surdian and installed his bride there. The next day, December 9, Mrs. Drake complained because her husband was untidy and unclean, and Monday she deserted him, going to her sister-in-law, Mrs. William Case, in New Britain, Mass. Mrs. Drake yesterday returned to her husband, who promised his bride to mend his personal habits. Mrs. Drake has the reputation of having been a neat housekeeper.
