OPONENTS OF VACCINATION.

About a dozen members of the Brooklyn anti-compulsory vaccination league met Saturday evening in the director's room of the Brooklyn Library, in Montague street, Brooklyn, and decided to change the name of the organization to the New York city anti-vaccination league and to extend its operations throughout the city. Dr. Montague K. Levermore, the president, asked the members to "consider what steps can be taken to arrest the groundless and unjust scare raised by the board of health, and to arrest and punish the lawless and tyrannical conduct of said Board of Health in breaking into the houses of citizens and forcibly injecting into their blood the patrefying matter of a sore."

Dr. Levermore said the Board of Health did not want to get rid of smallpox, but did desire to create a scare. He asserted that he had seen the about thirty cases of smallpox without giving notice to the Board of Health, and that all his patients had recovered without a scar. He thought every case of smallpox, with certain exceptions, should be cured in from two to six days, and that smallpox would never become infectious if properly treated. It could not be shown that vaccination ever prevented a person from getting smallpox, except by the doctor's opinion, in the doctor's opinion, was producing a degenerate race among all the vaccinating nations of the world. He urged that a mass meeting be held at which the public might be led to assert their rights. He said he would see some of the colored persons who were forcibly vaccinated in Brooklyn recently, after he doctors of their homes had been forced, and urge them to sue the city. Many suggestions were made as to how the public could be aroused against vaccination. One member wanted to appeal to Comptroller Coler on the ground that the city's money was being wasted by the board of health; another wanted to appeal to the mayor, and a third would invoke the aid of the Legislature. It was decided to try to enlist the interest of the various trades unions.

SIGHT CAME WITH YEAR.

Several weeks ago Mrs. Geo. Baker, the wife of a prominent contractor, of Trenton, N. J., was stricken with a serious illness. Within a few days after she took to her bed total blindness came upon her and the best physicians were summoned to treat the case. They exhausted their knowledge and announced to the family that if the woman's sight was restored it would be a miracle. They believed that the optic nerves were paralyzed. Eye specialists were consulted, but they could do nothing for the afflicted woman and she, like the other members of the family, gave up hope of recovery. Mrs. Baker continued to improve physically and on New Year's eve she was able to sit up and participate in the ceremonies with which the departure of the old year was celebrated. Just as the clock chimed the first stroke of midnight and the bells and whistles announced the arrival of the new century, Mrs. Baker sprang to her feet and cried out: "I can see! I can see!" Then she burst into tears of joy. Examination showed that the woman's sight had been completely restored, and there was great rejoicing in the Baker family. The physicians are unable to account for the return of Mrs. Baker's vision. They say that it could not have been aided by the medicine that she was giving her. Mrs. Baker herself is inclined to look upon it as a miracle.

BRIDE AND \$25,000 OFFERED HIM.

William S. Gill, who is playing in the "Village Postmaster" at the Fourteenth street Theatre in New York, received a letter on Friday from his father, James Gill, a veterinary surgeon of Boston. The letter first announced that his uncle, Major John Reynolds of the British army, had died in Liverpool from injuries received in the Boer war. The letter then continued: "His solicitors have notified me that you are well provided for, on condition that you carry out a certain stipulation of the will. The condition is this: You must go to England and marry the adopted daughter. If you will comply with your uncle's wishes, his solicitors wrote me, he has set aside for you \$25,000."

A BACHELOR DINNER.

Mrs. Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt, whose marriage to Miss Esie French will be celebrated in Newport on Monday, January 14, gave his farewell bachelor dinner Saturday night at the Metropolitan Club, New York. The dinner was served in what is known as the red room of the club. The party was received by Mr. Vanderbilt in an anteroom adjoining, and as

the guests were assembling there was music by an orchestra conducted by Mr. Nathan Franko. In the centre of the table was a superb oval of American Beauty roses, which, in accordance with the custom of farewell bachelor dinners, was sent to the bride-elect. The sending was not an easy matter, as the bride-elect is in Newport. The roses were sent by the midnight train to Newport and placed in a special compartment, guarded by two men.

"TAKE THAT AND LEAVE."

On the banks of the Restless Ford of Paint creek, in Fayette county, Ohio, a party of hunters were encamped. A man and his wife in the company could not get along pleasantly together, and they agreed to separate and divide their property.
