THE QUEEN'S FUNERAL.

King Edward, availing himself of an occasion in the thirty-fourth year of Queen Victoria's reign, directs that February 2 be observed as a day of general mourning. The banks will be closed and business suspended. The Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's Cathedral have drafted a memorial service which, if approved by the Privy Council, will be used throughout the country. It is a modification of the burial service with penitential psalms and suitable music.

The authorities have decided to hold only a noon service at St. Paul's, abandoning the proposed general communion at 9:30 a. m., owing to the statement of the police that it would be impossible for them to handle any crowd like that which assembled near the cathedral on Sunday, and concurrently to meet the demands that will be made on them elsewhere. The police estimate that 30,000 were turned away from the cathedral Sunday.

It is understood that the route of the funeral procession of the Queen next Saturday has been fixed from Buckingham House Road past the palace and the Mall to Marlborough House gate, thence through St. James street and Piccadilly from Hyde Park corner to the Marble Arch and Sussex Gardens, and thence to Paddington station, where the coffin will be placed on a train for Windsor.

Several cream-colored Flemish strollers from the Buckingham Palace mews will draw the gun carriage on which the casket will rest. The harness will be the same as that used during the jubilee procession, and will be covered with orange. The horses will be led by men of the Royal Artillery. The wheels of the gun carriage will have rubber tires. The pall, which will be of white embroidered satin lined with white silk, will be made by the students of the Royal School of art and needlework, at South Kensington. It will be nearly ten feet long and seven feet wide with two heavy gold fringes.

The royal arms will be in each corner surmounted by a crown. The lion will be in applique cloth of gold and the unicorn in applique cloth of silver worked in silk embroidery. The crown will be embroidered in silks and gold bullion, the ground work for the quarters being entirely in stitches of crimson and gold respectively, with d-vees in colors.

The garter will be of blue silk with the motto in gold. The ribbon will be of silk applique with the motto in gold.

Emperor William's influence with the King induced the resolution to make the funeral a strictly naval and military function. The authorities of the island expected to take part, but it was decided yesterday afternoon that they would only be allowed to look on from a fixed position within the grounds of Osborne House.

It is said that this exclusion of civil dignitaries is for the sake of uniformity in the procession, though originally the King was disposed to accede to the request of the mayor to be permitted to take part in the function.

The procession will leave Osborne House at 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon, York avenue, which leads from Osborne House to the Trinity pier, where the body will be embarked on the royal yacht *Albion*, which will be guarded by troops. The Trinity pier will be divided into two parties, one of which will occupy a place inside the grounds of Osborne House, while the other will be stationed on the pier.

Emperor William has cordially thanked King Edward for his invitation to the German Crown Prince with the Order of the Garter.

King Edward has ordered that any draping for the Queen's funeral shall be with purple and not black.

The admiralty announces special steamship accommodation at Spithead for peers, members of the House of Commons, and press representatives who are unable to obtain any other special facilities.

AHEAD IN MASONIC BANK.

King Edward VII. of England has been representative James D. Richardson, of Tennessee, chairman of the Democratic Congressional Committee. In all matters of Masonry the British ruler is less exalted than this American citizen. The King is Grand Commander of the Knights Templar of England, Ireland and Wales, while Representative Richardson is Sovereign Grand Commander of the Southern Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite Masons of the United States. As such Mr. Richardson distinctly ranks the new ruler of Great Britain. The Scottish Rite is the highest order of Masonry in the world, and Mr. Richardson, as the head of the mother jurisdiction, from which the order was introduced into Great Britain, is the most exalted Mason on the globe. He is a life officer with a salary of \$3,000 a year.

It is not probable that the question of precedence will ever arise between Edward VII. and the American Congressman. Less than a month ago Richardson today said they could conceive of no circumstances under which it could arise. If the King came to the United

States and should attend a Masonic celebration in which Mr. Richardson participated he would be shown all the honors of a distinguished visiting brother, but as he would be outside of his jurisdiction, there would be no possibility of a clash. So, on the contrary, if Mr. Richardson should meet the King at a Masonic gathering in England, it would be Edward that would be really more correct, therefore, to say that Mr. Richardson is more exalted than the King than that he is the superior of His Majesty.

Albert Edward has been Grand Master of the Templars of the United Kingdom since 1873, he having been initiated into Masonry and the Templar degree in Sweden. This assumption of the Prince of Wales effected a perfect reformation of the order there and procured for it a status not before enjoyed.


